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
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If a serious emergency occurs at DCPP that requires you to take action, you will hear a steady siren for three minutes. This means you should tune to a local radio or television station, or Marine Channel 16 while at sea, for emergency information and instructions.

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This notification system is tested periodically throughout the year.

This year's annual test is on Saturday, August 26.

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$San\ Luis\ Obispo$ There are many things to discover around SLO

The city of San Luis Obispo has many faces. It is the seat of county government, a business and shopping center, and a traditional college town.

To sample the "SLO life", as locals refer to it, put on your walking shoes and start at the San Luis Obispo de Tolosa mission, the fifth in the mission chain in California.

San Luis Obispo is alive with history, and a walk around downtown will expose you to many structures from the early days.

Some must-sees are the Ah Louis Store at 800 Palm Street. Constructed in 1874, it was the supply station for Chinese laborers who built the railroad tunnels through the mountains of the Cuesta Grade. Other historic buildings include the Sinsheimer store with an iron front, built in 1884, at 849 Monterey Street, the Jack House at 536 Marsh Street, which was built in 1875 and the State Historical Landmark Dallidet Adobe at 1185 Pacific Street, is open Fridays and Sundays.

Visit the History Center of San Luis Obispo County on Monterey Street where an extensive collection of area artifacts are displayed.

The museum is housed in the original Carnegie Library built in 1905 with granite from Bishop Peak, one of the Nine Sisters. The sisters are a chain of volcanic peaks stretching from the city to the ocean at Morro Bay along Highway 1.

Drive across town to visit an architectural wonder: the Madonna Inn. Built by the late rancher, Alex Madonna and his wife, Phyllis, it sits in splendor by the side of Highway 101, on Madonna Road.

Horses graze in the whitefenced fields on the property. A quality restaurant is on site and touring the public rooms is a must. You can see the dining room, the wine cellar and be sure not to miss the men's restroom. Even women should take a peek to see the waterfall urinal.

The inn has 109 theme-based rooms and a stay here might have you sleeping in the Safari Room or

the Caveman Chamber, or even the Old Mill Room with its own waterfall. There is also a convention center where many special events take place.

After touring the Madonna Inn, drive over to the largest open space in the city, Laguna Lake Park at 504 Madonna Road. Here there are picnic tables and barbecues, large grassy areas, and of course, the lake. Feeding the many domestic and wild ducks and geese is a popular pastime.

There is a nice walking trail along the lakeshore and a launching ramp for kayaks and canoes. Boating on the lake is fun, but best done in the morning hours before the winds come up.

A visit to California Polytechnic University's agricultural center makes for an interesting time. Here there is a full-scale working dairy with Jersey and Holstein cows. There is also the swine unit, horse unit, and chicken house as well as the CalPoly farm. Students in the agricultural division supply

produce and dairy products to many local families as well as local supermarkets.

Plant aficionados will enjoy seeing the San Luis Obispo Botanical Garden on Highway 1 at Dairy Creek Road in El Chorro Regional Park. The gardens are a lovely quiet place to stroll or sit and meditate. Mediterranean plantings as well as California natives are part of the landscape and an educational facility is on site where a variety of programs take place. 

San Luis Obispo Museum of Art

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Take a hike around San Luis Obispo

Panoramic views, family-friendly trails & more

The panoramic views offered along trails are just one of the many reasons San Luis Obispo –known to locals as SLO – was recently named the happiest town in America.

Bishop Peak is the highest of the Nine Sisters – a string of volcanic peaks that span the 12 miles from Morro Bay to San Luis Obispo. The trailhead for this 3.5 mile hike can be located on the left hand side of the cul-de-sac at the top of Highland Drive. While Bishop Peak is a more strenuous climb than its sisters, the views are incomparable. When you reach the peak you'll find all of SLO laid out before you in a stunning display from the Cuesta Grade to Morro Bay.

Johnson Ranch offers a loop that takes you through the wooded

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hills and grassy vistas of a historic 242-acre ranch. The trailhead for this moderate 3.7 mile hike can be located right off 101 South by exiting

at Higuera St. At the bend in the road, turn into the parking area for Johnson Ranch.

Irish Hills can be reached by parking on the street at the end of Madonna Road where a sign will offers multiple options for exploring this reserve. Irish Hills were named as such by Irish Immigrants; the old schoolhouse that was once the center of the Irish Hills School District still stands near the trailhead. After a brief climb in Irish Hills, the trail begins to dip and curve, carrying you across footbridges and under oak tree canopies as it rises into a clearing, providing panoramic views of Bishop Peak, SLO, and Cerro San

Islay Peak is a smaller sister located on the southernmost tip of the Nine Sisters string. Parking at the end of Sweet Bay Lane and a 1.8 mile round trip hike will bring you to the peak where the wineries of Edna Valley will unfold beneath you, rolling in perfect symmetry all the way to Pismo, hemmed by the beautiful Santa Lucia Mountains.

Bob Jones Trail is a 5 mile round trip paved trail that takes you from SLO to the pristine coastal town of Avila Beach. Park your car in the lot on Ontario Road and walk or bike over a path that takes you along the San Luis Obispo Creek and through the Avila Golf Course; sprawling oaks provide enough shade for hot days. You'll see jogging strollers,

bikes and walkers making their way to the coast and back on this familyfriendly trail throughout the year.

Pop over to Bubblegum Alley

Unique tourist attraction is not to be missed

Bubblegum Alley is a tourist attraction in downtown San Luis Obispo, California, known for its accumulation of used bubble gum on the walls of an alley. It is a 15-foot high and 70-foot long alley lined with chewed gum left by passers-by. It is located in the 700 block of Higuera Street in downtown San Luis Obispo.

How bubblegum alley got started is not completely clear. Some historians believe that the tradition of putting gum in the alley started after WWII as a San Luis Obispo High School graduating class event. Others believe it started in the late 1950s, as rivalry between San Luis Obispo High School and California Polytechnic State University students. By the 1970s, Bubblegum Alley was well established.

Throughout the years, San Luis Obispo's Bubblegum Alley has been

featured on a number of television shows, news programs, and in newspapers around the world such as the New York times and the Los Angeles Times, The San Francisco

Chronicle and Ripley's Believe it or Not. "Weird Al" Yankovic mentioned Bubblegum Alley in his 1978 song "Take Me Down," an ode to San Luis Obispo. Agreement whether these gum-covered walls should remain a part of quaint downtown San Luis Obispo has not been reached since its founding. While some locals consider this alley to be an "eyesore," the Chamber of Commerce lists it as a "special attraction." Store owners' complaints concerning upkeep are countered by the argument that it increases foot traffic and business.

The Alley has inspired professional artists such as Matthew Hoffman. On the east end of the alley, up high on the north-facing wall, a giant self-portrait of Hoffman titled "Projectbubble Gum" is created entirely with bubble gum. The picture of the artist blowing a bubble required a tremendous amount of gum, which he was able to get with the help of the community.



Go wine tasting in San Luis Obispo's Edna Valley



Edna Valley is a charming coastal valley located just south of the city of San Luis Obispo and north of Arroyo Grande that boasts dozens of vineyards and wineries.

With its gentle sunshine, cool maritime fog and rich oceanic and volcanic soils, the Edna Valley appellation boasts California's longest growing season. This extended growing season allows for more time to coax layered and complex flavors from the grapes.

Driving the back roads of San Luis Obispo County's picturesque Edna Valley is spectacular any time of the year with its rolling hills and vineyards, panoramic views, and historic school houses and barns.

Taste wines in a historic schoolhouse

Traveling down Orcutt Road from San Luis Obispo, the Bailey-ana-Tangent-True Myth tasting room is the first you will encounter as you enter the Edna Valley. Open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. year-round, the tasting room is housed in a quaint schoolhouse built by the local farming community in 1909. When in operation, the school-

house served students ranging from kindergarten through twelfth grade who hailed from the surrounding farmland areas.

For over four decades and three generations, the Niven family has farmed their historic Paragon Vineyard, the largest family owned and operated vineyard in the Edna Valley. It spans more than 1,100 acres, producing extraordinary grapes that are used to craft the many wine styles expressed within the family's different brand projects.


The wine tasting experience is designed to accommodate all visitors' individual needs, according to Karl Boone, the Winery's Direct to Consumer Manager. "We realize each person who visits us has

Sustainability championed at Laetitia

The Laetitia Estate Vineyards were first planted to grapes in 1982



when French viticulturists found ideal growing conditions in the Arroyo Grande Valley for producing wines of similar character to those of their homeland in Epernay, France. Nineteen years later, the property would be acquired by Selim Zilkha, founder of a successful wind power development company and champion of environmental sustainability.

The winery has employed creative methods such as covercropping and goat grazing, which preclude the need for harmful pesticides and herbicides or tractors that run on fossil fuels. President and Head Winemaker Eric Hickey has been instrumental in completing and championing the Vineyard Team's progressive Sustainability In Practice (SIP) certification process, of which Laetitia is a founding participant.

Other pursuits in the ways of sustainability on the ranch include a complete analysis/retrofit of their irrigation system to ensure that they are accommodating the needs of the different soil types on the

ranch, as well as more mechanization (to assist in the labor shortage) and employing bio control strategies, such as raptors and falcons to hunt and feed on animals which attack the grapes.

The region known as Edna Valley has been producing grapes for hundreds of years.



Explore bluffs, caves and more



In the past, tribal members of the Chumash held a yearly gathering on the bluffs above the ocean in Central California. Here the males carried on tribal business while the women collected shells on beaches below. These meetings were possibly the first time people picnicked in Shell Beach. You too can enjoy a day's outing by stopping at some of the parks perched atop these cliffs.

Drive down to Ocean Boulevard at Cliff Avenue and stop at Margo Dodd Park. Here you can enjoy the gazebo and gaze out to sea and search for passing whales or watch the brown pelicans, cormorants and gulls that use the cliff sides and sea stacks as resting places. There are barbecues and picnic tables here for your use also.

Continue on Ocean Boulevard and you will come to Eldwayen Park, a great place to watch the sunset. Here too, you can climb down the stairs to the beach and at low tide explore the tidepools. Picnic tables and benches are located along the cliffs.

Memory Park is a small patch of pleasant green with beautiful coastal views. Spyglass Park is next at Spyglass Road and Solano Road. This is a good spot to watch surfers who take advantage of the nice offshore swells.

In the Sunset Palisades residential area, Palisades Park has picnic tables, barbecues, and benches for you to enjoy the views of San Luis Bay.

The newest park in Shell Beach is Dinosaur Caves Park, an 11-acre site. This spot is popular with joggers, fishermen, and folks walking dogs. A great children's play section is located here. Every first Sunday of the month an outdoor art show sets up in the park.





Although ATVs are available for rent on the beach, be sure to stop by an ATV rental's storefront as well. One of the best places to learn about ATVs and rent one or two for a day on the beach is at BJ's ATV Rental, located at 197 Grand Ave. in Grover Beach, and the No. 1 rental company in the area since 1982.

Before renting an ATV, be prepared to fill out release and liability forms and get basic safety instruction before being released to ride in the dunes. Suty recommends visitors to the county make a trip to the dunes, even for a day, to walk along the sand, hang out at the beach, ride ATVs or small dune buggies, play volleyball, shop in the nearby towns or go for a plane ride.





"There's a myriad of things to do – it all depends on what you're looking for," Suty said.

Before heading out to the dunes, the Friends of the Oceano Dunes offers tips on what to bring and what to do and not to do:

- DO arrive at the beach at low tide – find a tide schedule at www. oceanodunes.org
- DO air tires down to 20 lbs. per tire
- DO carry a cell phone for emergencies
- DO bring extra keys; they are difficult to find if dropped in the sand.
- DON'T make sharp turns in the sand

How to get there From San Luis Obispo, exit Highway 101 at Pismo Beach to Highway 1, turn right at the light in Grover Beach to enter the state park. Entrance fee is \$5 per vehicle/day. Vehicles should be fit to drive along the beach, as the dunes are two miles from the entrance. Camping, overnight fees, and annual passes vary, see ohv.parks.ca.gov for more information or call 1 (800) 444-7275 or (805) 773-7170; additional safety tip available on the website.

- DON'T stop when driving uphill
- DON'T ride ATVs with a passenger or without a helmet
- DON'T take glass bottles to the beach.





os Osos, Spanish for "Valley of the Bears," is off the beaten path and the gateway to Montana de Oro, an amazing state park along the ocean. The town has many quaint places of interest for visitors to stop on their way to and from the state park. Try one of the many restaurants or grab something to take with you for a picnic at the beach or one of the nearby forests.

Montana de Oro

Los Osos Valley Road leads right into the state park. The park, popular for day visitors, has 50 primitive sites. The park is well-used with daily visitors throughout the year who go there to hike, picnic, fish, camp, surf, take a dip in the ocean or visit the tide pools. The visitor center is located at Spooner's Ranch House Museum above Spooner's Cove. The cost to enter the park is free. (805) 528-0513. For camping call (800) 444-7275.

Elfin Forest

The forest has nearly 200 species of plants, more than 100 varieties of birds, and many species of mammals and reptiles and amphibians. The forest includes a 1-mile boardwalk that is wheelchair accessible at the north end of 16th Street. Guided tours are given on the third Saturday of each month at 9:30 am starting at the north end of 15th Street off Santa Ysabel. (805) 528-0392.

Baywood Pier

The pier, at the intersection of 2nd Street and El Morro Ave., overlooks the shores of the back bay of Morro Bay. It is a quiet place to sit and enjoy the

estuary. Grab something to eat and enjoy watching the many species of birds in the bay.

The Los Osos Oaks State Reserve

Half-mile east of South Bay Boulevard on the south side of Los Osos Valley Road. The reserve has an easy onemile trail through the "Pygmy Oaks", which are dwarfed coast live oaks. The low canopy reserve is on the site where Chumash Indians once lived.

Sweet Springs Nature Preserve

Located on the north end of Ramona Avenue between Broderon and 4th Street. The park is open from dawn to dusk and has trails that wander through the Monterey cypress and eucalyptus trees around two freshwater ponds and a salt marsh to the edge of Morro Bay. The preserve is managed by the Morro Coast Audubon Society. Monarch butteries are plentiful in this preserve from late October to March.

Baywood Park Farmers' Market

On Santa Maria Ave. between 2nd and 3rd streets. The market takes place every Monday from 2-4:30 pm and offers fresh, local, in-season produce. (805) 748-1109.

Bear statues

On your way into Los Osos notice the large grizzlies stationed as guards into the town at South Bay Boulevard and Los Osos Valley Road. The statues were created by local artist Paula Zima.

Nipomo is a small town on the mesa in the southern area of San Luis Obispo County that is known for its stands of eucalyptus trees, expansive golf courses, and one of the largest swap meets anywhere.

Nipomo is home to the historical residence of Captain William G. Dana whose descendants populated the area and started the town. His adobe house still stands near the 101 Freeway (danaadobe.org.)

Other attractions in the city are the Nipomo Native Gardens, where a forest of native plants and trees are maintained by volunteers from the Nipomo Native Gardens Society, The Nipomo Native Garden is a 12-acre site located between Pomeroy, Camino Caballo and Osage (nipomonativegarden.org.)

The huge Nipomo Swap Meet and Flea market is on the grounds adjacent to the 101 Freeway at the Teft Street off-ramp. The Nipomo Swap Meet & Flea market combines great family entertainment with old school swap meet atmosphere. It is the largest swap meet on California's Central Coast and is open Friday, Saturday, and Sunday from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. It's free but there is a fee to park.

Enjoy outdoor adventures in Nipomo

Nipomo is a Chumash word meaning "base of the hills." The land signified great promise for William Goodwin Dana, the Bostonian sea captain who married in Santa Barbara, received a land grant in 1837, and settled the 37,888-acre Rancho Nipomo. Today, Nipomo, the southernmost gate of San Luis Obispo County, still ignites a sense of anticipation in visitors from near and far.

Standing on the wet sand of the shore of the Pacific, looking out over the sprawling Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes toward the rich, riparian woods, the creeks, the fresh water lakes and the Santa Maria River, you can see many of the same views that Dana once did and that the Chumash did before him.

Dune Diversions

The 3,400-acre Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve, part of the dune complex that stretches from Pismo to Guadalupe and Lompoc along the Pacific Ocean and which is one of the largest remaining coastal dune systems in the nation, is a must-see excursion for visitors.

A walk along the coast from the preserve entrance down to giant Mussel Rock affords incredible vistas of the tallest sand dunes on the West Coast, sculpted and contoured by the winds into a scene other-worldly enough that it made the perfect set for the film The Ten Commandments, shot nearby. Here, amid the seemingly untouched, wind-swept mounds and bowls of constantly shifting sediment, the sands of time have stopped and modern hikers can see



the same landscape in which the Chumash once lived and hunted.

Lake Leisure

Also part of the Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve (to the north of the beach entrance), the Oso Flaco Lake hike provides a more manicured experience of the dune ecosystem on a zen-like trail made largely of boardwalk. The path crosses a 75-acre freshwater lake, dunes, forest and marshlands, all the while offering an environment of pervading tranquility that transports hikers from the modern world into a serene state of oneness with nature.

Further north, along the edge of the Oceano Dunes, there is a cluster of fresh water lakes that lie provide habitat for migrating birds and a secluded, little-known escape for hikers. Black Lake is one of these, and one of the only lakes accessible to the public. The SLO Land Conservancy offers docent-led circumnavigations of the dark, peat-colored lake, while the nearby Black Lake Canyon trail is open for self-guided

tours and horseback rides.

For golf enthusiasts, Nipomo offers some of the best golfing on the Central Coast, with scenic options like Black Lake, The Woodlands, Trilogy at Monarch Dunes, and Cypress Ridge.


Families on the Frontier

Families visiting Nipomo will do well to stop at the Nipomo Regional Park, which has endless outlets for activity of all kinds. The park provides baseball fields, playgrounds, tennis and volleyball courts, an off-leash dog park, and barbecue and picnic areas at one end, while it also comprises the more rustic native plant garden and 80 acres of open trails for hiking and horseback riding.



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Enjoy hiking in Morro Bay

There are various options for hikers of all levels



Morro Bay is rich with natural beauty, and there is no better way to experience it them by hiking. There are numerous trails that can accommodate a variety of outdoor leisure activities.


A great easy hike, perfect for a brisk fall morning, is black hill, the second to last of nine volcanic peaks that lie between San Luis Obispo and Morro Bay – the last being Morro Rock itself. Morro Rock, a sacred space for two local Native American tribes, is not hikeable except with a special permit. The distance from the Morro Bay State Park campground to the top of Black Hill and back is approximately three miles with an elevation gain of 600 feet. This scenic and enjoyable hike is relatively easy and can be done in just an hour or two.

Just south of Morro Bay is beautiful Montana De Oro State Park. Montana De Oro is spanish for, "Mountains of gold," and refers to the small yellow flowers that bloom throughout the park. There are numerous hiking trails through the park, including Bluff Trail, a level

coastal trail, which is suitable for bikes and wheelchairs. It is about 2.1 miles long one way with a host of side trails that allow for outings between one and five miles. The hike is the perfect way to see all the tide pools, beaches, rock islands, and natural bridges, along the stunning coastline of the park, hitting highlights like Corallina Cove, Quarry Cove, and Grotto Rock.

Start from the north end of the Bluff Trail at a parking area on Pecho Valley Road just past the visitor center and across from the trailhead for Valencia Peak. More adventurous hikers can continue up Valencia Peak, one of the highest summits in the park. It provides arguably some of the best views of the park's stunning shoreline and inviting inland peaks. About 3.7-miles round trip, there is 1,275 feet of elevation to tackle, with a few level steps allowing you to catch your breath amidst the scenic climb to the amazing 360-degree views from the summit.

Cayucos: The last of the California vintage surf towns






Shopping, strolling, surfing and more

Downtown offers an eclectic architectural flair synonymous with its cultural history and features antique malls, gift shops, surf shops, candy and ice cream stores, fine dining restaurants and an old-world tavern. The wharf, initially built in 1872, was first used by commercial steamships from both Los Angeles and San Francisco who docked here several times each week.

It's also a popular place for skin diving, swimming, surfing and stand up paddle boarding.









Sea glass collectors and beach walkers enjoy miles of shoreline while dogs race in and out of the surf. The Cayucos Dog Beach, located just south of Cayucos along Studio Drive, is one of the only off-leash dog beaches in the county. With Morro Rock in clear view and merely 5 miles to the south, this stretch of beach is vast and the views are incredible. It's not uncommon to spy dolphins playing in the surf along with sea otters and sea lions.

Year-round events


Along with the annual 4th of July festivities, which bring thousands into this coastal jewel with the sights and sounds of parades, live music and fireworks. The Cayucos Sea Glass festival is hosted each March.

As one of the premier events on the Central Coast, visitors come from all over the country to enjoy a weekend of local artisan goods, fun in the sun, live music, and of course an extensive marketplace of the finest sea glass art.

Downtown Ocean Ave. becomes a pedestrian zone while browsers and shoppers can checkout the many goods being offered by local and visiting vendors in October during the town's Antique Street Fair. Each New Year's Day, Cayucos again comes to life with its annual "Polar Dip" swim where thousands head together into the brisk water. Invigorating to say the least, it's another one of many annual traditions that keeps this such a close-knit community.



Explore the 'The Enchanted Hill'

In 1865, George Hearst purchased 40,000-acres of ranchland that included the Mexican Ranchos of Piedras Blancas, San Simeon and Santa Rosa. In 1919, his only son, William Randolph Hearst, inherited the land from his mother, Phoebe Apperson Hearst. By then the ranch had grown to encompass 250,000 acres.

Originally known as "Camp Hill," it offered a place for family and friends to "rough it." Despite elaborate arrangements with separate sleeping and dining tents, Hearst envisioned more and worked with famed San Francisco architect Julia Morgan to create one of the world's greatest showplaces. Hearst renamed it "La Cuesta Encantada" – The Enchanted Hill – and, by 1947, he and Morgan had created an estate of 165 rooms and 127 acres of gardens, terraces, pools



and walkways.

Museum

The William Randolph Hearst exhibit located in the visitor center offers an insightful look into the castle, architect Julia Morgan, and owner W.R. Hearst. Family histories, vintage photographs, and historical documents provide an intimate look at Hearst's personal life.


See beautiful works of art from Hearst's collection; learn about his career in media, publishing, and politics. Youngsters can explore the exhibit with a free treasure hunt map and earn a prize. 





The building itself has gone through a series of modifications, however, the clock tower that was added in 1952 still stands as a local city landmark.

In 1999, new ownership took over, and after extensive remodel-














Explore Mission San Antonio de Padua

The mission that time forgot

Just forty-five minutes outside of Paso Robles, nestled snugly against the foothills of the Santa Lucia Mountain Range, you can take a step back in time and discover a hidden treasure: Mission San Antonio de Padua.

Founded on July 14, 1771 by Fray Junipero Serra, San Antonio was the third in the eventual chain of twenty-one Alta California Missions instituted by the Franciscan Order. The Spanish government, eager to establish territorial claims in the New World had already built presidios at the ports of San Diego and Monterey. Mission San Antonio represented their first inland venture for the Franciscans, and Serra protested formally against a Spanish Military presence at this new mission, citing multiple human rights violations against the Indigenous Peoples by the Spanish

soldiers. Mission San Antonio, therefore, was the first Mission established without a Spanish Presidio. Ironically, the mission is now completely surrounded by Fort Hunter Liggett, an Army Reserve base that serves as the Western Regional Training Center for all branches of the military.

Unlike the majority of the California Missions, San Antonio did not have a city grow up around it after secularization. Today, it appears much as it would have during the Mission era. Protected, both as a California State and a National Historic Site, the eighty-six acres sit like an oasis from a bygone era. Still visible are remnants of the ancient aqueduct system, the workings of the mill pond, original river rock threshing floor and grist mill. Without the effects of light pollution, the night sky at the mission presents



a stunning array of stars, flung far and wide, telling their timeless stories by way of glittering diamond constellations.

Mission San Antonio currently continues to serve a small but stalwart parish community of less than six dozen members. This community grows at each of its annual fundraising events, one set in each season.

History, however, is not all that San Antonio has to offer. The mission offers an excellent ten-room museum of mission-era artifacts and an exceptional Southwest-



ern Indian basket collection. The museum is temporarily closed as the final touches of the a restoration project are completed.

The Mission Gift Shop and Gallery displays the artistic creations of over one hundred artists. This elevates the shopper's selection of available unique gift items and ensures that many of the items are truly one-of-a-kind.

Vital to the daily operating budget is the revenue stream from the Mission Retreat Center. In a world that often spirals out-ofcontrol with busyness, the peace and serenity of this historic site nurtures a sense of calm well-being. The mission accommodates both private and group retreats focusing on either spiritual or educational purposes.

California State has mandated that all unreinforced masonry buildings in the state and serving the public must be seismically stabilized to remain open. In 2010, in response to this call to improve safety conditions for the thousands of guests and visitors to the mission, a group of concerned community members established a non-profit 501 c-3, named Cam-

paign to Preserve Mission San Antonio Unlike the de Padua (www. preservemissionsanantonio.org) Tasked with the goal to raise the California the money necessary to fund the massive seismic retrofit/restoration project, this group has been hard at work soliciting donations.

August 4, 2014 construction work began on Phase I (of five phases) of the retrofit project. To date, Phase I (the Church), Phase II (South Convento including Museum, Library, Cloister, Gift Shop and Parish

Offices), and Phase III (West Convento Retreat Rooms) have been completed. The seismic work and the electrical upgrade of Phase IV (North Convento Retreat Rooms) is nearing completion.

erosity of many individuals and foundations, we have accomplished approximately three-fourths of the stabilization/restoration project," said Joan Steele, Mission Administrator. "We are now at a critical junction. Our money has run out and we are in need of approximately \$3 million to complete the

remaining plumbing and ADA compliance work. We are asking for your support. We need to get the word out about this hidden gem on California's Central Coast."

Redwings Horse Sanctuary: providing a safe haven for gentle giants

Many of us have consciously chosen to adopt an animal from the local humane society in order to offer a beloved new pet a much-needed home. What happens to larger animals desperately needing a secure place to live, largely due to prior abuse, neglect or abandonment?

Located in Lockwood, CA, Redwings Horse Sanctuary is a safe haven for those gentle giants that don't have a forever home. Horses are much harder to place than dogs and cats because of the space needed to keep them and the cost involved in feeding and caring for them. They offer permanent sanctuary for those equines that are "unadoptable" because of age, illness, or injury.

The mission of Redwings Horse Sanctuary is to eliminate the causes of equine suffering through education and community outreach

programs, to rescue abused and neglected equines, and to provide permanent sanctuary or selected foster homes for those equines.

Redwings has a foster to adopt program to ensure that every horse is placed in the right home. Those who wish to adopt one of our




equines will go through a one year fostering program complete with initial and quarterly facility inspections. If the foster goes well for the horse and caregiver, the caregiver can then choose to adopt (and become the owner of the horse) or continue to foster (Redwings retains

ownership of the horse). If the Redwings Horse Sanctuary's primary goal in overseeing the foster process is to ensure that each horse and caregiver is doing well together. We have had 21 successful fosters and 8 adoptions in the last couple of years.

The organization has initiated









numerous programs including an equine education program for new horse enthusiasts, and an emergency medical assistance program called "Helping Hooves." Redwings partners with Fort Hunter Liggett to help train soldiers in the reserves on safe horsemanship and basic equine husbandry and emergency medicine. In previous years Redwings has worked with many different organizations including local 4-H clubs, Kinship groups, and the Girl Scouts to educate children about horses.

Community wise, they currently offer numerous public events including the recent Annual Blessing of the Animals. Generally conducted in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures, this nondenominational event is just one of the many ways Redwings and their dedicated team supports the health and well being of animals and their overall importance in our lives. They also participate in the Paso Robles Pioneer Day Parade.

Starting out in May 1991 as a non-profit, 501(c) (3) organization in Carmel, California named CHAPS, Redwings initially rescued 15 equines from abusive or life-threatening situations. Their dedicated staff rehabilitated these equines and matched them with carefully-screened adoptive homes. In 2000 Redwings moved to a 167-acre ranch in southern Monterey County, California where it peacefully lies today.

"We have been blessed by a generous donor's gift that has allowed us to purchase property in Paso Robles that will allow us to have a permanent home for our Sanctuary and the horses. It is going to take some time to ready the property for our equines. Our current location is remote which limits our ability to attract volunteers, ambassadors, and donors. We are looking forward to embracing the community of Paso Robles says Andie Wilcox, Executive Manager, and we hope that they will embrace and welcome us as well.

Thanks to artist Anne Laddon's space for artists and art lovers alike, Studios on the Park in downtown Paso Robles serves as a major hub of the Central Coast's thriving art community. Dedicated to sharing the creative process with locals and visitors, this nonprofit organization and open studios art center has grown to include six studios with 16 artists, four galleries and a fine craft gift shop since opening in 2009.

Local artists work in a variety of mediums at Studios on the Park. including acrylic, charcoal, collage, mixed media, mosaic, oil, pastel, pen & ink, photography, printmaking and watercolor. Styles range from traditional to contemporary. The unique combination of artist workspace allows visitors to view the art as it is being made.

History and community connection

From its location along the treelined eastern edge of the downtown city park, Studios on the Park boasts an array of activities for visitors and community members, as well as the opportunity for visitors to purchase and learn about art being made locally. Residing in a historic building that once housed an auto repair shop and a variety of auto show rooms, the art center has maintained the original character of the building

through its repurposing. The facade, with its floor-to-ceiling windows, lets in abundant light; the sign on the front of the building was designed to mirror old-fashioned auto repair shop signs; and decorative touches throughout remind visitors of the history of the space.

A connection to the community was a part of Laddon's vision from day one – a variety of classes are offered throughout the year. With its Kids Art Smart program, the nonprofit provides free, hands-on art classes to local elementary and middle school children, more than 8,000 to date. Studios on the Park also celebrates Art After Dark Paso. a fun tradition of art, wine, and live music-filled evenings on the first Saturday of every month.

With its continued presence both in the community and in its space downtown, Studios on the Park

continues to make a huge impact on the landscape of the arts in Paso Robles and the entire Central Coast.

Discover the past at Pioneer Museum

Take a free tour and explore Paso Robles history

The Paso Robles Pioneer Museum, located at 2010 Riverside Avenue, south of the Paso Robles Event Center (fairgrounds), is a great place to visit for an afternoon excursion and to learn the history of the Paso Robles area. Knowledgeable docents are on hand to answer questions.

The 20,000 square feet of building space shows Paso Robles through the years, even before it was Paso Robles, and gives visitors a glimpse of what life was like in the good ole days. A non-profit organization, the Paso Robles Pioneer Museum is funded by donations and events throughout the year.

Exhibits galore

The museum opened in 1975 with a 6,000 square-foot building, which now houses the collection of antique buggies, carriages and cars. Visitors to the museum will explore three large rooms that have different interesting exhibits.

Start the tour with learning about the geological eras, and view petrified bones that were from the Paso Robles vicinity. Next, learn about the area's Western heritage, including an exhibit with cowboy, horse and saddle artifacts.

One exhibit in the Museum is dedicated to the famous pianist Ignacy Jan Paderewski, who came to Paso Robles for the healing powers of the baths when his rheumatism became debilitating in the early 1900s.

Another exhibit shows an old-fashioned Linotype machine that made it easier to produce type; the blocks used to produce printed materials for a printing press are also on display. In the Paso Robles Bank display are a collection of antique typewriters, calculators and other office equipment. Next to the bank vault, discover rifles and shotguns collected by Clark S. Smith.

The country store display is sure to have visitors transported back in time. The post office exhibit, part of the general store, shows Mr. Patsey Dunn's store, the home of the first post office in Paso Robles, as well as

mailboxes from San Miguel.

Several of the exhibits show life as it was in the early years of Paso Robles, including a pioneer housewife hard at work, with the wood-burning stove she used for cooking and for heating irons to press clothes. There is a parlor and a bedroom scene complete with lamps, candles, handmade quilts, baby carriages and much more.

Transportation Hall & schoolhouse

In Transportation Hall view the many showcased vehicles that have been used over the years, including antique cars which are kept running by volunteers, and carriages and wagons, some of which are used in the annual Pioneer Day Parade. Also, be sure to check out the wall filled with almost 900 different kinds of barbed wire, made by different manufacturers, collected over many years.

The Geneseo schoolhouse stands outside the main building on the museum grounds. It was donated by the family of the late Linden Chandler in 2004 and shows a typical rural one-room school during the early years of the community.

The Paso Robles Pioneer Museum is located at 2010 Riverside Avenue, south of the Paso Robles Event Center, and is open Thursday through Sunday from 1-4 p.m. Admission is free, but donations are always welcome. Special groups can also arrange a tour, and the museum is also available for special events. For more information call (805) 239-4556 or see the website at www. pasoroblespioneermuseum.org.



Soon, Nef was inspired to embark on his own idea for a Paso Robles winery, one that would honor his European roots while embracing the unique growing region in order to pursue his dream of producing world-class wines.

Nef selected longtime friend and business associate Hans - R. Michel, a Swiss expatriate, as managing partner. In 1997, a year later, the duo planted the first of what would later become six vineyards in Paso Robles, and soon thereafter









slovisitorsquide.com **FALL 2017** Vina Robles was born. Winemaker Kevin Willenborg joined the team in 2012.

In 2007, Nef achieved another goal with the opening of the Vina Robles Hospitality Center, a 14,000-square-foot facility that combines classic California Mission-style design with modern European elegance. The center features a tasting room as well as several venues for public and private events. In summer of 2013, the

Vina Robles Amphitheatre celebrated its grand opening and now hosts around 30 world-class artists April through October each year.



The olive oil is of the highest caliber, with



The building is a masterpiece. "The architect who designed the interior, went on to win the Smithsonian National Design award




in 2013," Damian said. He mentioned that it was fortunate that the award was given after he designed Brecon, because it likely would have made him unavailable due to subsequent international demand.




Brecon's 2012 Reserve Cabernet is aged 22 months in French oak, resulting in a divine, silky, smooth finish.

Family-run winery creates wine with character

Four Lanterns Winery begins with its name. When Steve and Jackie Gleason relocated from Southern California to Paso Robles, they changed their family's entire lifestyle, but not their identity— the Gleasons are a family who works together and seeks new and interesting experiences.

The four lanterns are Steve and Jackie's four daughters, Sarah, 21; Christina, 19; Janet, 17; and Sage, 13. "They are the lights of our lives," said Jackie, a former physical therapist who now works with her husband, Steve, a former financier, to run Four Lanterns. Steve said he was successful in his former work but didn't want to grow old there.

"I had run my course in my career and wanted to do something else," he said.

The Gleasons took over their vineyard property in the summer of 2013 with harvest staring them in the face.

"We decided to go ahead and make wine that year, hired Amy Butler as our winemaker, and crushed at Grey Wolf," Steve said. Two whites and a rose were submitted to the California Mid State Fair in 2014 and all won silvers straight out of the gate.

That was an affirming beginning for the family. Prior to purchasing their vineyard, the couple had been looking at beach properties down south but, as they tell the story, Jackie and Steve couldn't agree on any of the properties they viewed.

Around the same time, they were considering property in the Paso Robles region when they got a call that what would become Four Lanterns was available. Steve took the drive north — about four and a half hours on the road — and immediately fell in love. He called his wife and said, "I want to buy this place," to which she answered, "OK," sight unseen.

Asked why she agreed to the purchase, Jackie said, "I told him, 'You know what? You have such excitement in your voice. Let's buy it."

Steve commuted each week for the first year until he and his family could make the move. Though production is small, the Gleasons have big plans for their property.

Before Four Lanterns, the property was Sycamore Farms Natural Herb Farm and Vineyard and now focuses on the grapes and outdoor community. Where herbs once grew, there will be a stage — once permits are secured — to provide the outdoor space with live music and magnificent views. Behind the

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tasting room, there will be a production facility.

The Gleason's 22 acres of vines consist of "the flats" along Highway 46 and "the terraces" that are South of the flats and reach up and over the large hill on their property. The tasting barn is on the East side of the flats. The property is managed by Roberts' Vineyard Services with onsite managers, Caitlyn Pierini and Armando Ortiz.

The Four Lanterns tasting room sits behind a farmhouse just

inside the entrance to the property. Inside the tasting room, the walls are covered in art, including three large canvases that contain the work of painter Roderick Reed of Laguna Beach, a family friend. Carol Timson Ball, from Templeton, also shows her work at the property. Carol's canvases focus on local points of interest.

The room contains Four Lantern wines and a few other items dear to foodies and wine connoisseurs. Among them are Smith and Truslow

spices, a business run by Steve's sister, Jean Gleason. The spices aren't ground until an order is placed, making them ultra fresh.

New this fall is the Thursday night Singer Songwriter Series. Local singer/songwriters perform on Thursday nights from 5-7.

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Peachy Canyon: a trendsetting and groundbreaking winery

Welcome to a slice of Paso Robles history. The word "Peachy," evokes thoughts of peach blossoms, intoxicating flavors and aromas that are almost too good to be true. While those are characteristics of some of Peachy Canyon's wines, the name has nothing to do with the fruit. "Peachy" was an infamous horse thief who took refuge in a cave near the original winery on Peachy Canyon Road and was eventually caught and hung in town. Jesse and Frank James also hid out in the same area in 1868.

In 1982, Doug and Nancy Beckett, San Diego teachers, moved to Paso Robles purchasing a walnut farm. It wasn't too long until Doug got the "wine" bug. Starting with a five-gallon Sparklette's water bottle and zinfandel grapes purchased from Benito Dusi's vineyard, Doug



began his winemaking career under his Tobias label. In 1988 the Peachy Canyon label was launched, with 350 cases of zinfandel; you could say "a star was born." Ten years later the Beckett's purchased the Old School House Vineyard (along with the old school house) on Bethel Road and today own four vineyards totaling 120 planted acres.

During the late 1980's the Paso Robles wine industry was still in its early development. Doug was ahead of his time. The walnut grove was basically organic, being dry farmed and simply had to be "maintained." Doug and his sons (who would eventually found their own Paso winery, Chronic Cellars), practiced sustainable farming long before it was a trend or an agricultural necessity. Pioneers in the practice of sustainable farming, Peachy Canyon were first Sustainability in Practice, or SIP, certified in 2007; truly leaders of the pack.

Whereas Peachy Canyon grows all four of the major Bordeaux grapes, they are known for their zinfandel. Step into the historical School House tasting room, or sit out back on the porch or pleasant outdoor area and sample many of



their award winning wines. For the reasonable \$10 tasting fee, guests can choose 6 wines from the tasting menu, currently four whites and nine reds, including the highly acclaimed 2011 Para Siempre, (awarded 91 points by Wine Enthusiast, a San Francisco Chronicle gold medal winner, and named best of class at the Central Coast Wine Competition).

Zinfandel is the focus, and passion of the winery, who is currently producing 9 zinfandels, but don't discount the Bordeaux/Rhone varietals and blends. As winemaker Robert Henson says: "The best wine we make is what we don't put into it." Peachy Canyon lets the terroir and the grapes speak for themselves. And speak for themselves they do, with constant recognition, accolades and high scores from many of the most respected wine publications and competitions. Wine Enthusiast, California Grapevine, Vinous, California State Wine Competition, Stephan Tanzer, and the Central Coast Wine Competition are some of the organizations bestowing honors on Peachy Canyon wines. Recently, Connoisseur's Guide to California Wine awarded the 2013 Clevenger Zinfandel 91 points, and the Daily Meal recognized Peachy Canyon as "one of the 101best wineries in America," in 2015 and 2014.

The Becketts are also very charity focused, both locally and nationally. Charity begins at home, and after being able to guarantee jobs for their employees, and training up to six interns from around the world, the Beckett family pays it forward constantly. Whether it be supporting non-profits with fundraisers and donations, such



as the Ronald McDonald House and American Cancer Society, or giving their time to local organizations including the Paso Robles Youth Arts Foundation, Studios on the Park Youth program and Paso Robles Cancer Support Community, Peachy Canyon Winery makes a difference in people's lives every day.

From their small and humble beginnings in the 80's with their first 350 case release, Peachy has become a force in many areas. At 50,000 cases today, Doug is especially proud of the fact, as he tells you with a gleam in his eyes, that "Peachy has been taking Paso Robles wines around the world for 30 years. We were one of the first to introduce Paso wines to Europe, Asia and Canada." Of note, which emphasizes Doug's humility and philosophy, is his pride in taking Paso wines, not Peachy Canyon wines, around the world. That in itself speaks volumes.

As to the future, Doug expects one day his two sons will again join the business, continuing the tradi-


tion of producing the best possible wines, growing the best grapes, supporting their family (which is the entire Peachy Canyon staff), and continuing to serve others. A visit to Peachy Canyon Winery is an experience. And, if you are lucky enough to be able to catch Doug and sit down with him you will be mesmerized by his love, passion, enthusiasm and commitment. He will hypnotize you with his story, and the history of the area, which

for Peachy Canyon, started with a horse thief, and evolved into one of the most respected wineries in the Central Coast.

Bodega de Edgar and Hug Cellars: Two Wineries/One Family

A ugie and Raquel Hug founded hug Cellars in 1994. They started off making wine with the guidance of noted vintner John Alban at his Alban Vineyards winery in Edna Valley. Winemaker Edgar Torres joined the Hug team in 2005, and by 2014 the Hugs decided to leave the wine business. As Torres helped the Hugs facilitate their retirement, Torres kept thinking, "I couldn't just let Hug Cellars go away."

"The thought just didn't sit well with me," he said. "The Hugs have always referred to me as 'Mijo,' which means 'son' in Spanish. So, I decided to maintain the tasting room, purchase their existing inventory, and they gave me the rights to use the Hug Cellars name for future production."

Since being handed the reins, Torres continues Hug's approach of producing naturally fermented, un-fined and unfiltered wines that are 100-percent varietal and vineyard-designate and hand-crafted in small lots under the Hug label.

The intimate Hug Cellars tasting room is located in an industrial park off of Highway 46 and accessed from Union Road that winds behind the cluster of buildings.

During a recent visit, Torres guided us through the tasting lineup: a floral 2014 Larner Viognier, the rose-flecked 2015 Rosé of Syrah and the bold and fruity 2014 Rancho Ontiveros Pinot Noir are from Santa Barbara County. The elegant 2014 Cedar Lane Pinot Noir comes from Monterey County while the lush 2013 Shadow Canyon Syrah is from Paso Robles' York Mountain appellation. A non-vintage Against Time & the Tides is a fun blend of Grenache, Tempranillo, Syrah and Mourvedre, a perfect everyday, pizza and pasta wine. Torres plans to add a Cabernet Sauvignon that will be available to wine club members only.

Paying homage to his heritage and love of

Spanish varietal wines, Edgar Torres named his own small winery Bodega de Edgar. Bodega is a Spanish word for winery or cellar.

Bodega's De Edgar's intimate tasting room is tucked away behind Villicana winery on Adelaida Road. Although Bodega is noted for its Albarino and Tempranillo, the portfolio also includes distinctive blends of Bordeaux and Rhone varietals.

Torres' tale started in Cambria when he was eight. Growing up he had limited options, but managed to find a job with his sister and bussed tables at Linn's Fruit Bin restaurant. This experience led to catering jobs for banquets at the Hearst Castle in San Simeon.

"That's where I learned about food and wine pairing," said Torres. He soon moved on to Villa Creek restaurant in downtown Paso Robles.

"Villa Creek was a gateway," recalled Torres. "Cris Cherry, the restaurant's owner, was a good mentor." He further honed his wine education and met local winemakers such as Matt Garret-

son, Russell Fromm, McPrice Myers and Augie Hug.

Torres struck up friendship with his coworker Jacob Toft, who was also working as assistant winemaker at Garretson winery. After Toft departed, Torres took over at Garretson and soon moved to the adjacent Hug Cellars.

Torres takes quiet pride in his heritage and how it played into his success. "I've learnt to embrace it as a tribute to my parents who made the sacrifice, with ethics of hard work."

The Bodega wines are affordable, ranging in price from \$32 to \$48. The portfolio, noted for distinctive blends, includes over two-dozen wines. Visitors get to savor five wines at the tasting room.

The 2014 La Guerra is a fresh and crisp Albariño blended with Chardonnay that adds a touch of creaminess. The 2013 vintages of both



the Granacha and Tempranillo are well balanced and cellar-worthy.

Torres' love for Toro wines from Spain is reflected in Toro de Paso. The 2011 spicy Tempranillo-driven wine is blended with Grenache, Merlot and Mourvedre. The 2011 Mis Pasos is an elegant blend of Syrah and Tempranillo with a touch of Merlot that gives the wine a firm backbone.

Wines made to last the test of time

Hunt Cellar red wines are in the barrel for about three years and another two years or more in the bottle before being released – as in European countries, these are called "Grand Reserve." Because of the concentration and low yields of Destiny Vineyard's fruit and Hunt's winemaking style, the wines are made to last. At the Hunt Cellars tasting room, guests have the opportunity to taste both older and newer vintages.

"We've had over 150 wines earn from 92 to 98 points over the years," says Hunt, a humble man who is reluctant to brag. "Our cabernets have won the Best of California Wines competition five times and many of our other wines, including our pinot noir, merlot, Rhone blends and viognier, have also earned top honors."

When the Hunt Family established Hunt Cellars in 1996, it was the area's 37th winery. They had traveled the country, visited numerous prestigious wine growing regions, and were sold on the Paso Robles area because of the friendly people, creative wine blends, and the potential to make great cabernet. Their 550-acre Destiny Vineyard, named after their daughter, Destiny, consists of multiple terriors with varying elevations and has proven to be one of the top California vineyards, consistently producing many highly-acclaimed

"Even in what the critics call a bad vintage year, a great vineyard consistently produces the best wines," says Hunt.

Though blind now, Hunt was able to see the property's soil back

in 1996 and knew it was the type that creates the world's greatest wines – mountain top, which means no clay, very shallow and great drainage. The soil composition is white calcareous, sandy loamy with white limestone and chalkiness. The weather enjoys incredible ocean breezes and perfect heat with diurnal swings of up to 50-degrees during growing season, which is why Hunt decided to plant the vineyard west to east, to enjoy that ocean influence.

Music & wine inspirations

Many of Hunt's wines are named after his music including Unforgettable, a merlot; Rhapsody in Red, a meritage blend, and Bon Vivant and Cloud 9, both cabernets. A white grand piano, the centerpiece of the Hunt Cellars tasting room, is where Hunt often entertains guests with a musical number or two after his winemaker's dinners or as they sip wines at the bar, on the veranda or as they stroll along the lush landscapes.

One has to wonder – does the wine inspire the music or does the

music inspire the wine?

"Music inspires wine, wine inspires music," says Hunt. "Have you ever had a good bottle of wine without music? You don't want depressing music, you want uplifting music and something to fit the mood."

Hunt's current musical album, Rhapsody in Red, is available on iTunes, Amazon, and in his tasting room. It has received critical acclaim from Forbes Magazine, Music Making, and Investors Daily, to name a few. His upcoming motivational album, Everything is Possible, is geared towards inspiring young people. A firm believer in the power of positive thinking, Hunt says his positive outlook on life has helped him live out his dreams.

"I like to keep things upbeat and happy," he says. "It's worked for me so far and, even though I am blind, I have been blessed. I count my blessings every day and I like to encourage other people. No matter what this world throws at you, you can still be a winner."

With a newly-renovated tasting

room, a beautification process of the grounds, and the future expansion of the barrel room and event space, Hunt continues to improve upon his guests' experience. Hunt Cellars' new management and tasting room teams offer friendly service, an overall unique, educational tasting experience, picnic lunch options, wine pairing and verticals tastings on weekends, and barrel tasting.

C ome believe spirits from the Odearly departed come back to this realm to provide advice to loved ones. The Mexican traditions of visiting gravesites, maintaining, and setting up altars of remembrance for the celebration of the Day of the Dead, or Dia de los Muertos, have been happening for around 3000 years. In Mexico, altars are placed in homes and in churches, however, the United States typically uses them in museum exhibits. In Paso Robles, a special winery has joined in. For nine years, the small 15-acre family farm, Via Vega, hosts an annual Día de los Muertos Fiesta, and they have set up a sprawling altar of heartfelt photographs and offerings. Altars traditionally known as altares de Muertos, or ofrendas,

are the most prominent feature in the celebration, because they guide the souls back home. At Via Vega, the tasting room transforms from a casual place to an exceptionally

"It's not just a party, it's a remembrance, every year we learn something new," said April Gomez. For Larry and April, the owners of





A public altar blessing is held with the Catholic Church, and a Native American Blessing is performed the afternoon of October 29. Tickets for Saturday, November 4 the formal event with dinner, folk dancers, catered dinner and musicians are available to wine club members, and leftover

tickets for non-members can be purchased after October 15. The beautiful winery has rich scene of cultural magic, colorful ambiance, and delicious wines. For almost 10 years, Via Vega Vineyard has been celebrating Día de los Muertos in their own unique way.

Día de los Muertos isn't about mourning or sadness, it's about joy and remembrance, and to join the living and dead together to celebrate. The ritual of Day of the Dead goes back to Mesoamericans, and continues to this day, because it is relevant for so many multicultural people. Day of the Dead is spreading nationally, and it appeals to people who are connected in spiritual ways, and who are esthetically pleased, by the wide array of colorful décor and festivities that the holiday encompasses. Celebrating the dead and honoring the ones we have lost is done comfortably and beautifully in the tasting room of Via Vega.

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


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TASTING ROOM

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The history of wine on the Central Coast goes back to the time of the Franciscan Friars who traveled through California establishing Missions. Plantings in North County began around 1790 at the Asistencia on the Santa Margarita Ranch. Vines

are still growing adjacent to the existing Asistencia today. The padres produced wine for their communion service and also made brandy, which they exported. Frenchman Pierre Hypolite Dallidet was first landowner to put in a vineyard and develop a


commercial winery around 1853.


There is some debate as to which winey is the oldest in the Paso Robles appellation. Some historical writings say it was planted by Andrew York, a rancher from Indiana who planted a Zinfandel vineyard

in the late 1870s that eventually led him to establishing Ascension Winery that later became York Mountain Winery. It can claim the title of being the oldest continuously operating winery in North County, but only thanks to being purchased









by Epoch Winery in 2010.

The original four wineries in Paso Robles were Rotta, York, Pesenti, and Martinelli. Only Rotta winery operates under the same name to this day. Pesenti winery has since become Turley Wine Cellars.

Polish pianist Ignace Paderewski purchased 2,000 acres in the Adelaida area in the early 1920s. He planted petite sirah and zinfandel, and following prohibition had his wine made at York Mountain Winery. Paderewski's Rancho San Ignacio grapes became award winners and gained the Paso Robles wine region a reputation as a premier wine growing area.

Derby Wine Estates preserves historic almond tower

The historic Almond Tower building, located at 525 Riverside Avenue in Paso Robles, was originally constructed by the Paso Robles Almond Growers Association as a warehouse and processing plant for almonds. After some decline in the local almond industry, K.B. Nelson, a representative of the Farmers Alliance Business Association, purchased the building in 1936. For 84 years the FABA owned and operated the grain brokerage out of the building, closing their doors in 1975.

The historic building remained empty for ten years, until 1985. In 1985 it became "Riverside Centre" and was home to various businesses such as an appliance repair shop and a drywall storage business. For a short time, the building was owned by Smart and Final, who wanted to demolish the tower, but, after locals bound together in protest, and managed to get the building registered as a historical landmark, the demolition permits were pulled.

Ray and Pam Derby, who moved to the Central Coast in the early 1990s with the intention of retiring, purchased the building that is home to Derby Wine Estates in 2010. The Derbys took over this historic but derelict building after it stood vacant for 30 years, transformed it back to its original glory, and created a full production winery and tasting room.

Hearst Ranch Winery offers tastings at two historic locations

Hearst Ranch Winery's San Simeon tasting room shares space with one of the county's oldest Post Offices and Sebastian's Deli. The building was constructed in 1852 and was originally located on the cliff, about halfway out to "The Point" in San Simeon Bay. It was relocated in the early 1860's, with the help of horse drawn skids and lots of manual labor. Inside the building are antiques and vintage pictures of the area during the beginnings of the Hearst family ownership.

Hearst's new Jack Ranch tasting room on Highway 46 East in Cholame also celebrates history. The James Dean Memorial is located on the site; a dedication and tribute to the young actor who passed away well before his time, close to the location of the tasting room.

The tasting room in Cholame is located within the Jack Ranch Cafe, another one of the oldest buildings in the county, still operating as a small, family style restaurant. Rumor has it that Jack Ranch Cafe was one


of the "first ever" drive-thru food restaurants, where patrons would ride their horse up to the window to order and pick up their food as it was delivered down a wooden slide.

Rotta winery has been in operation since 1908

Rotta Winery has been around since 1908 and is known for its zinfandel, a wine that the Rotta family was able to continue making and selling during prohibition since it was used as a communion wine. In fact, many local vineyards made communion wine during prohibition.

Although it is not the oldest winery in the Paso Robles area – it was one of the first three. The winery was purchased from Frenchman Adolph Siot, who planted the first grapes and produced the first wine in Templeton. The winery was owned by the Rotta family until being sold to Jason Shorrock a few years ago.

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
