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
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# IMPORTANT EMERGENCY INFORMATION



### ABOUT DIABLO CANYON POWER PLANT



Welcome to San Luis Obispo County. We are glad you have chosen to visit. A fixture within our community is the Diablo Canyon Power Plant (DCPP). DCPP is a nuclear power plant that generates approximately 10% of California's electricity. Both PG&E and the County of San Luis Obispo have developed detailed emergency plans that would be used in the unlikely event that an emergency were to occur at DCPP.

If a serious emergency were to occur that would require you to take action, the County would sound the Early Warning System sirens. The sirens are an indication to tune to a local radio or television station for emergency information and instructions. When at sea, tune to Marine Channel 16.

The siren system is tested regularly throughout the year and may be used for any local emergency. This year's annual test is on Saturday, August 23.

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

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
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# There are many things to discover around SLO

The city of San Luis Obispo has much to see and do. It is the seat of county government, a popular dining and shopping destination and a traditional college town reflecting eclectic choices in art, entertainment, food and activities.

### Attractions

#### The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa Mission

The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa mission is one of the best known historical sites in town. Founded by Father Junipero Serra in September 1772, the mission was the fifth of the California missions and named after Saint Louis, Bishop of Toulouse, France. For information about tours and the gardens or attending mass visit missionsanluisobispo.org.

#### **Historical buildings**

Other historical buildings, many featuring unique architecture, include the Sinsheimer store with an iron front built in 1884 at 849 Monterey St., the Jack House at 536 Marsh Street, which was built in 1875, the State Historical Landmark Dallidet Adobe at 1185 Pacific St and the 1884 Ah Louis Store at 800 Palm St, originally a supply station for the Chinese laborers who built the railroad tunnels through the mountains of the Cuesta Grade.

The Madonna Inn, known worldwide for its elegant and quirky décor, has been a stop for visitors since first built in 1958. The inn, restaurant and over 100 rooms occupy 1000 acres of scenic Central Coast land.

The historic Carnegie Library on Monterey Street is home to the History Center of San Luis Obispo. Built in 1905, the library is one in a chain of over 1600 libraries funded by the United States by Scottish-American businessman and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. The SLO Carnegie Museum is one of three still standing and in use on the Central Coast. The other two are located in Lompoc and Paso Robles.

#### San Luis Obispo Botanical Gardens

Gardeners and outdoor enthusiasts are not left out. The San Luis Obispo Botanical gardens, on Highway 1 near Dairy Creek Road is the only garden in the United States exclusively featuring plants and ecosystems from the five Mediterranean climates in the world. The design includes miles of paved trails and shady resting spots and a variety of other activities.

#### **Hiking and cycling**

The city's Parks and Recreation Department operates several parks that span 7000 acres of breathtaking views and hiking trails. Visit the website for the City of San Luis Obispo for park maps details about the ease or difficulty of the trails.

The city has over 75 miles of bike paths and what better way for cycling

enthusiasts to enjoy a vacation. San Luis Obispo was designated a Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists in 2007. Visit bikeslocounty.org for cycling maps for the City of San Luis Obispo, wine trails and other locations in San Luis Obispo County.







She created an approachable service, delivering her sustainably grown harvest to a small collective of local medical patients. Working hard to improve the health of residents, MOM quickly became one of the most respected Prop. 215 cannabis collectives in California, and, in 2020, became the first operational storefront dispensary in San Luis Obispo.

With another location in Goleta, California, the team remains focused on contributing to the well-being of each community. MOM hosts educational events, dedicates volunteer hours, and sponsors local non-profits. Souza's heart is set on creating an environment where cannabis is destigmatized and embraced by providing access to high-quality products in a wholesome environment that promotes good health and good vibes.

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





#### Hiking

The Bob Jones Trail starts at the trailhead on Ontario Road and wanders along the San Luis Obispo Creek. The paved trail, about three miles from trailhead to downtown Avila Beach, is a mostly smooth hike or bike ride with benches along the way.

## Attractions

#### **Dinosaur Caves Park**

Observe dolphins, whales, sea otters and other sea life as well as sea and shore birds such as gulls, cormorants, and Peregrine falcons. Reservations may be required for group events. #### **Oceano Dunes**

Thousands flock to the Oceano Dunes State Recreational Park to camp along the ocean in tents and RVs every week. You can rent and ride dune buggies and ATVs on the beach and enjoy riding for the entire afternoon. There is a small cost per vehicle to drive on the beach and it is recommended you have a larger vehicle before attempting to drive on the dry sand; you don't want to get stuck in the dunes.

#### Ocean views

Pismo Beach is home to several parks with beautiful, panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean and birds and marine life that live and migrate through the Central Coast. A few of the most popular parks with exquisite views, trails, places to rest, picnic and enjoy the scenery include:

• Chumash Park covers 38-acres of wetlands, willows, oaks and is home to a rich variety of birds and wildlife. Bring a camera. Leashed dogs are welcome.

• Eldwayen Ocean Park meanders over a mile along the bluffs and has stairs down to the beach and the tidepools. Check a tide chart to visit during low tide to explore the tidepools.

• Margo Dodd Park, located on a bluff above the ocean includes breathtaking panoramas of the ocean, beaches and surrounding areas. Bring binoculars and a camera. Walk the sandy beach to a tidepool at the end of Pier Street.

## Hiking and scenic walks at the Pismo Preserve

The preserve provides over 11 miles of trails wandering through 880-acres of oak woodlands and coastal ridges and some of the most stunning panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean and surrounding land and beaches. Trails are marked for the direction of travel. Park is open weekdays from sunup to sunset. Pismo Beach, Shell Beach & Oceano

#### **Price Historical Park**

This four-acre park and open space provides hiking trails and a class 1 bike trail. The park incorporates a self-guided history walk recognizing Chumash culture and the history of missions and Pismo Beach. The gated Meherin House and Price Anniversary House, built by Pismo Beach founder, John Michael Price, are also located in this park. Visit 365 days a year during daylight. 



few short blocks from the  ${f A}$ iconic Pismo Beach Pier, on the corner of Cypress Street and Stimson Avenue, stands a brick building with double doors swung wide open. As you step inside the Thomas Kinkade Showcase-By-The-Sea Gallery, the bright sunshine, salty sea air, and the tantalizing scent from Pismo Fish & Chips fade away as your eyes adjust to the dim lighting. Spotlightilluminated paintings wink at you from every corner, eliciting hushed tones as you wander the cool, quiet gallery.

A California native, Kinkade was known as the "Painter of Light," using techniques perfected by a distinguished group of nineteenthcentury American painters, known as the Luminists.

"I try to create paintings that are a window for the imagination," Kinkade once said. "If people look at my work and are reminded of the way things once were, or perhaps, the way they could be, then I've done my job."

"Thom's peaceful paintings reach a variety of people. Anyone is bound to fall in love with one of his many styles and scenes," explains long-time gallery owner Ann Smith. "Thom's paintings draw you into a place where you would like to be."

While Kinkade's work is most often associated with whimsical



landscapes and cozy English cottages, a stroll through the gallery will broaden your horizons with Kinkade's interpretation of Baseball, NASCAR, and the "ever-popular Disney Collection."

Smith and her team have done their job as well, showcasing Kinkade's work in the best light. Dimmer switches positioned next to the paintings allow you to experience the beautiful transformation Kinkade pieces make throughout the day – a single painting appears new at dawn, dusk, and noon.

Since it was first established in 1993, the gallery has built countless relationships with collectors and tourists alike, offering a quiet cultural reprieve from the busyness of Pismo Beach.

"Through the years, we have helped many decorate their home with what I believe is timeless, superb art," Smith said. "We work in a most peaceful setting at the beach and have made many wonderful friends through the years."




# Dinosaurs, orcas, picnics, and hiking

### Dinosaur Cave Park offers breathtaking ocean views

Dinosaur Cave Park is a beautiful oceanside, all-age, and dog-friendly open space along Shell Beach. In some ways, the park continues its original attraction as a family destination, but today the attractions are the playground, the picnic area, and the trails along the bluffs instead of a huge dinosaur sculpture and cave tours featured in the 1940s.

Visible from Highway 101, this park offers exquisite views of the Pacific Ocean – an ideal place for practicing some photography, holding a wedding ceremony, and for people of all ages to enjoy. A trail running along the bluffs boasts viewing platforms and a spacious grass area – a favorite among dog owners,

it is also a popular picnic spot and perfect for various athletic activities. An amphitheater is available to rent for events.

Picnic tables next to the play area are perfect for enjoying a snack or meal, or simply enjoying the surroundings. The bathrooms, very well kept, are located by the parking lot, and parking is free; street parking is also available.

In the play area, several structures await visitors and add to the theme of the park, including an Orca whale, a dinosaur, and other ocean animals. Children can climb on or inside the large dinosaur eggs; a tire swing and boat promise hours of fun.

Named after a 50-foot metal and concrete brontosaurus that was constructed as a tourist attraction in the 1940s, the location of this park was the original site of a roadside business and cave attraction owned by H. Douglas Brown. The dinosaur became a target of neighborhood complaints and, in the 1960s, eventually went the way of its prehistoric cousins. The property was bought and sold several times for different uses and eventually acquired by the City of Pismo Beach. Through years of volunteer efforts, the property eventually became the Dinosaur Caves Park and was officially opened in 2003.

The park is a location for public events, including art and craft fairs, wine and food festivals, and concerts.

Wildlife includes more than 150 species of birds, including wild turkeys, eagles, hawks, condors, deer, sightings of coyotes, foxes, rabbits, and other small mammals, lizards, and snakes, including rattlesnakes!



Marina concessions open at 7 or 8 a.m. and close between 4-6 p.m., depending on the day.

There is a day-use fee, payable at the entrance kiosk located at the campground entrance, or make day-use reservations online at slocountyparks.com.

# Nipomo

Nipomo is a small town on the mesa in the southern area of San Luis Obispo County that is known for its stands of eucalyptus trees, expansive golf courses and special outdoor and nature experiences.

Nipomo preserves a spirit of true frontier land even while modern businesses thrive in its commercial areas. Standing on the wet sand of the shore of the Pacific, looking out over the sprawling Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes toward the rich, riparian woods, creeks, fresh water lakes and the Santa Maria River, one imagines seeing the same views that the original Chumash saw while going about their daily activities. The word "nipomo" means "base of the hills" in the Chumash language.

Bostonian sea captain, Captain William G. Dana acquired a land grant in 1837, and settled the 37,888-acre Rancho Nipomo. His adobe house still stands near the 101 Freeway.

### Attractions

#### **Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes**

The 3,400-acre Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve is one of the largest remaining coastal dune systems in the nation and is a mustsee excursion for hikers, naturalists and bird-watchers. Catch glimpses of more than 200 varieties of birds and view more than 120 imperiled plants and animals within the preserve's National Wildlife Refuge and surrounding dune habitat.

#### **Nipomo Native Gardens**

A forest of native plants and trees are maintained by volunteers from the Nipomo Native Gardens Society. The Nipomo Native Garden is a 12-acre site located between Pomeroy, Camino Caballo and Osage, nipomonativegarden.org.

#### **Nipomo Swap Meet**

The huge Nipomo Swap Meet and Flea market is on the grounds adjacent to the 101 Freeway at the Teft Street off-ramp. The Nipomo Swap Meet & Flea market combines great family entertainment with old school swap meet atmosphere. # Luffa Farm—a rare gem in wine country

A destination for 'adventurous knowledgeseekers'

We all know that San Luis Obispo County features nearly 300 wineries, but one of its hidden gems, The Luffa Farm, is also a rarity and a must-visit destination.

Owner Deanne Coon began growing luffas in the early 1980s by accident when a college friend was given some mystery seeds for a project. Deanne was known for her green thumb, so she planted the seeds in her garden. As the mystery seeds sprouted and grew, no one could identify the plant. It quickly became "that part of the garden I'll get to this weekend." for a few weekends in a row. As luck would have it, those extra weekends allowed the plants to dry out. While tearing out the dried plants and pods, Deanne and her companion heard rattling. They curiously opened a pod and behold! They discovered luffa!

#### A squash with a purpose

So, what is a luffa? Many people think that the luffa (or loofah as it's sometimes marketed) grows in the sea. However, loofa is actually a squash that's closely related to the cucumber and has been a skincare necessity for thousands of years. Most luffas sold in the United States are imported and subjected to chemical treatments. The luffas Deanne has been growing in Nipomo since 1999 are a fantastic and eco-conscious choice.

What started as a hobby grew into a business. Deanne began growing luffa to sell to local gift

shops and spas, but "pretty quickly, word got out around town that the 'luffa lady' lived across from the golf course, and people regularly tracked her down, knocked on her door and asked to go scuba diving

for luffas with her," according to Brooklynn Gamble, gift shop manager and tour guide

ager and tour guide. People began showing up every day, and Deanne enjoyed showing them the farm.

Her husband built the gift shop, and the farm has been open to the public ever since. The Luffa Farm grows between twelve and fifteen thousand luffas each year. Most are sold in the gift shop with homemade soaps and bath products. Guests learn about how luffas are grown on their free drop-in tours. The gift shop occasionally has luffa seeds for sale for those who want to grow their own.



Get ready to be patient because luffas take six to nine months until they are ready to harvest. Deanne grows them in

pots with string for support so gravity can help them grow into a straight luffa. Gamble explains, "They start out looking like cucumbers or zucchini growing out of the back of a flower." At this point, they're ready to eat, but the magic happens when left on the vine. The luffa fibers get larger and denser. The vine eventually sucks the water out of the gourd and recycles it through the rest of the plant. Gamble continues, "When it's completely brown and crisp, it's ready to harvest. We cut it off the vine, whack it to break it open, and shake the seeds out from the center. Then we peel the skin off, rinse it out, and trim it into whatever size luffa we need."

Summer and fall are perfect for visiting The Luffa Farm. Drop-in tours are offered for groups of fewer than 12 for free. For groups of 12 or more, a reservation is required along with a \$5.00 admission fee per person.

The Luffa Farm, located at 1457 Willow Road in Nipomo, is open Wednesday-Sunday, 10 a.m.- 4 p.m. For more information, visit theluffafarm.com or call (805) 343-0883.

# Los Osos and Baywood Park

Los Osos, Spanish for "Valley of the Bears", is off the beaten path and the gateway to Montana de Oro, an amazing state park along the ocean. The town has many quaint places of interest for visitors to stop on their way to and from the state park. Try one of the many restaurants or grab something to take with you for a picnic at the beach or one of the nearby forests.

#### Montana de Oro

The park is well-used with daily visitors throughout the year who go there to hike, picnic, fish, camp, surf, take a dip in the ocean or visit the tide pools. The park's visitor center is located at Spooner's Ranch House Museum above Spooner's Cove. The park is free to enter. (805) 528-0513. For camping call (800) 444-7275.

#### Elfin Forest

The forest has nearly 200 species of plants, more than 100 varieties of birds, and many species of mammals and reptiles and amphibians. The forest includes a 1-mile boardwalk that is wheelchair accessible at the north end of 16th Street. Guided tours are given on the third Saturday of each month at 9:30 am starting at the north end of 15th Street off Santa Ysabel. (805) 528-0392.

#### **Baywood Pier**

The pier, at the intersection of 2nd Street and El Morro Ave., overlooks the shores of the back bay of Morro Bay. The Los Osos Oaks State Reserve Half-mile east of South Bay Boulevard on the south side of Los Osos Valley Road. The reserve has an easy one-mile trail through the "Pygmy Oaks", which are dwarfed coast live oaks. The low canopy reserve is on the site where Chumash once lived.

#### Los Osos Community Park

Located at the corner of Los Osos Valley Road and Palisades Avenue, the park includes a 17,000-square-foot skate park, three tennis courts, playgrounds and restrooms. The park is ideal for walking or picnicking and is the site of the Los Osos Valley School, one of five original one-room schoolhouses between San Luis Obispo and the coast. Of those five, only two still exist today, both in Los Osos.

#### Sweet Springs Nature Preserve

Located on the north end of Ramona Avenue between Broderon and 4th Street, the park is open from dawn to dusk and has trails that wander through the Monterey cypress and eucalyptus trees around two freshwater ponds and a salt marsh to the edge of Morro Bay.

#### Baywood Park Farmers' Market

On Santa Maria Avenue between 2nd and 3rd streets. The market takes place every Monday from 2-4:30 p.m. (805) 748-1109.

#### **Bear statues**

On your way into Los Osos notice the large grizzlies stationed as guards into the town at South Bay Boulevard and Los Osos Valley Road. The statues were created by local artist Paula Zima.



# Morro Bay A sightseer's delight

Explore the natural beauty of Morro Bay, a town famous for its fog and fishing. Whether for a day or a week, this small town by the Rock has something for everyone.

Morro Bay is bursting with exciting activities to try. There's deep sea fishing, whale watching, world-class surfing, hiking, biking, and kayaking.

When it comes to birdwatching, there's little doubt that Morro Bay provides the best chance for observing a great variety of species. It's an incredible birding spectacle. There are also harbor seals, sea lions, and sea otters.

Looking to take a slower pace? Stroll down the Embarcadero and browse gift shops and art galleries. Explore the local cuisine and dine on fresh caught fish. Sit on a bench in Tidelands Park and watch the boats leaving the harbor or take a walk on the beach and watch the waves. Walk out the harbor boardwalk to Morro Rock, the 576-foot volcanic plug that looms over the bay and seashore. Keep an eye out for sea otters that rest in the kelp beds near the shore.

### Attractions

#### **Morro Bay Maritime Museum**

This museum has been preserving and interpreting the maritime history, especially that of California since 1995. The current fleet on exhibit includes the tug boat "Alma" that rescued sailors from the December 1941 Japanese attack on a Union Oil tanker off the coast of Morro Bay and the "Avalon," one of two Deep Submergence Rescue Vehicles (DSRV) submarines designed to rescue crews of downed submarines. The museum is located at 1210 Embarcadero in Morro Bay. For hours visit morrobaymaritime.org.

#### **Morro Bay State Park**

Morro Bay State Park, located at 60 State Park Rd. Morro Bay, features lagoon and bay habitat, all in view of Morro Rock. The park has opportunities for sailing, fishing, hiking and bird watching and features a marina and an 18-hole golf course. The Morro Bay Golf Course is located at 201 State Park Rd. Call (805) 772-1923 for hours and tee times.

The park is a California state park, visit parks.ca.gov for information about parking, hours and other attractions.

#### **North Point Natural Area**

Operated by the City of Morro Bay, the North Point Natural Area has a stairway that leads down to the beach. Once on the beach, people can walk north to Cayucos or south to Morro Rock. The beach has one of the best tidepool areas. In the spring, the meadow is full of blooming wildflowers. The entry is located on Toro Lane in Morro Bay.

#### **Black Hill Trail**

Located at Main St and Parkview Dr., this 2.5 mile trail is a moderate hike. The trail is a favorite spot for nature walks and birdwatching. Leashed dogs are welcome.

#### Giant chessboard at Centennial Parkway

According to the United States Chess Federation, the Giant Chessboard at Centennial Parkway, 806 Embarcadero, is only one of two outdoor chessboards in the United States. The other is located in New York City. The Morro Bay Chess Club installed chess tables and benches adjacent to the Giant Chessboard. The Giant Chessboard is available for reservations, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., through the Morro Bay Recreation Services for a small fee. Visitors are always welcomed to join the Morro Bay Chess Club on Saturdays beginning at noon. For more information call (805) 772-6278





Nationally recognized artist brings online art classes to the Central Coast



# From whale watching to a Tiki cruise, sail away with Lost Isle Adventures

Every trip is born from a lifelong passion for the ocean

Summer is here, and June through August is the peak humpback whale watching season. These giants of the ocean are migrating north to cooler waters from their southern wintering grounds. Lost Isle Adventures departs from Morro Bay daily at 9:30 a.m. for two to three hours of watching whales, dolphins, sea lions, pelicans, cormorants, and other seagoing wildlife.

Owner and captain, Dane Jacobs, is a local who grew up on the Central Coast. During his time at Cal Poly, His earliest dreams were of owning his own business. "After studying the world's oceans through the Semester at Sea program, I was inspired to create a business that would showcase the beauty of my hometown and promote ocean conservation," he said.

"Lost Isle Adventures was born out of a lifelong passion for the ocean, boating, and marine life. With a lifetime spent embracing the waves and safeguarding beachgoers as a former lifeguard, my bond with the ocean runs deep. From my earliest days, I harbored a dream of owning a business on the water — a dream now realized."

#### **Expect unique encounters**

The whale watching tours are seasonal aboard the Angler, a 50foot U.S. Coast Guard–inspected vessel built for safe, rugged, oceangoing adventures. The vessel offers a stable, comfortable ride designed to handle coastal waters with ease, giving guests peace of mind while enjoying incredible marine wildlife experiences. With a heated interior, a restroom, and a cocktail bar, it's the perfect combination of adventure and relaxation.

What kind of encounters can guests expect? Morro Bay is a working harbor surrounded by a state marine reserve. Open ocean-bound guests usually see otters, seals, and seabirds. Once in the open water, the curious humpback whales often approach the boat and, at times, circle for over an hour. In past trips, large pods of Pacific white-sided dolphins rode the bow wake! According to Jacobs, "In the summer and fall, visitors typically see humpback whales. Winter and spring grey whales — they're incredibly active, often breaching and tail-slapping. We've also seen blue whales, the largest animals on earth, and even the occasional fin whale. On some trips, we see a few whales; on exceptional days, we've had pods of up to 30 or more around us at once! Every day on the water is a little different, which is what makes it so exciting."

If going onto the open ocean for up to three hours is too long of a time commitment, there's always the 45-minute Tiki Cruise around the Morro Bay Harbor. Sit back and relax while taking in Morro Rock, the Three Stacks, and, of course, the marine mammals, while enjoying a 1950s-style cocktail. The Tiki Boat is a retro-inspired cruiser that's mostly enclosed and covered, offering protection from the wind. It's perfect for any time of year!

Short on time but still want to see whales? The 90-Minute Go Fast Adventure tour is perfect for smaller groups or the time-pressed. Jacobs says, it's, "a thrilling, fastpaced tour on the Falcon designed for the adventurous or anyone who just wants to go fast!" The Falcon is a 24-foot speedboat originally designed for the U.S. Navy. Built for stability and performance, it's perfect for those looking for a fast-paced, adventurous ride while viewing marine wildlife both in the harbor and offshore.

# Private charters for special adventures

Lost Isle Adventures also offers private charters for groups who want custom experiences, such as wildlife photography or a sunset cruise. Summer is busy, and tours book quickly. Jacobs recommends booking one to two weeks ahead, but he'll always try to accommodate last-minute bookings. He's passionate about the Central Coast and loves to share his knowledge about local wildlife. His goal on every tour is to treat everyone like family and "to impart my profound affection for the Central Coast to every guest who crosses my path, ensuring they leave with cherished memories of this breathtaking locale."

#### **Explore tidepools**

Rocky areas around the pier on Cayucos State Beach are great areas to find tidepools. Estero Bluffs State Park north of Cayucos is another area with plenty of tidepools. Depending on the tide, the animals that can be seen in tidepools include small fish, shrimp, sea stars, hermit crabs, anemones, sponges, sea urchins, tube worms, sea cucumbers and many, many more. Please leave the tidepools exactly as you found them. Tidepools are special, fragile systems and disturbing the animals and plants can cause harm.

#### Fishing

Fishing on the pier and from the shore of Cayucos State Beach is a favorite activity for locals and visitors. No fishing license is needed. Surf fishing is also allowed but a license is needed. Deep sea fishing is also available from local commercial fishing businesses.

#### **Beach activities**

The Cayucos State Beach stretches five miles south to Morro Bay. Run, jog, or walk as far as you like. Leashed dogs are welcome. Other beach activities include surfing, boogie boarding, kayaking or sitting in the sand and building sand castles.




# Small town soul with a world beat

Considered by many to be one of the last California vintage surf towns, Cayucos is a surprising fusion of small-town soul with a world beat. Its village charm, vast stretches of spectacular California coastline, some of the best food and wine, family dining and shopping in the region make Cayucos a favorite for locals and visitors.

The name, Cayucos, is the Spanish word for the canoes used by the Chumash who originally inhabited the area. The town took its name from the original Mexican land grant, Rancho Moro y Cayucos.

#### Shopping, strolling, and surfing

Surfing, stand-up paddle boarding, skin diving, swimming, and boating are certainly traditions rooted in the town's relationship with the ocean.

The buildings are an eclectic collection of architecture that house local businesses, including antique shops, gift shops, candy and ice cream shops, surf shops, fine dining, and an old-world tavern. The Cayucos Pier, originally built by town founder, Captain James Cass in 1867, is a popular location for fishing, strolls, and watching surfers, dolphins, sea lions, and otters. The annual New Year's Dav Polar Bear Dip is held in full view of the pier. Hundreds of people show up each year to take the icy plunge and cheer on the swimmers.

Sea glass collectors and beach walkers enjoy miles of shoreline. Serious beach walkers can hike the beach from Cayucos to Morro Bay, except at high tide. Leashed dogs are welcome along most of the beach, and there is a small section along the way known as Dog Beach, one of the few where dogs are allowed off-leash.

#### Kites, wind, and waves

It's not unusual to see a few kites, or more, dancing in the breezy beach sky. The breeze makes the beach a perfect place to see how high your kite can go and how many tricks you can make it do. The wind and waves create perfection for some brisk windsurfing, and the waves are known to give surfers some challenging rides.

#### Always something to do

Just off Highway 1, and about 30 minutes from Hearst Castle, Cayucos is a great place for a travel break or to spend a few to several days. There are a variety of hotels and accommodations, many with beachfront views, and lots of things to do and see for the entire family.

The town is also famous for many different street fairs and festivals throughout the year. Discover all there is to see and do in Cayucos by checking out the Cayucos Chamber of Commerce event calendar at cayucoschamber.com.

# **Cambrid**, San Simeon & North Coast

The charming village of Cambria is filled with unique shops, galleries, and restaurants serving all kinds of delicious food. The shops have everything from antiques, specialty items, household gadgets, exquisite jewelry, and art from the quirky to traditional. Walking through the village, along flower-filled yards and shady trees, the well-maintained buildings, many dating from the 1800s, all come together in a sense of how life in a more tranquil time must have been.

Cambria is also known as the gateway to Hearst Castle, glorious ocean scenery along Highway 1, and during the month of October, is the heart of the Cambria Scarecrow Festival. The festival is an outdoor display of whimsical handmade scarecrows that draws visitors from all over.

### Attractions

#### **Historical walking tour**

Visit the Cambria Historical Society website (cambriahistoricalsociety.com) for a map of a walking tour of Cambria's historical buildings. The self-guided tour encompasses 28 buildings and the map includes a written history of each one. Learn the fascinating history of these old buildings and how their uses evolved

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from the original business or residence to their current occupations. Learn a little about the people and families who shaped Cambria's early years.

#### Visit the elephant seals

The elephant seal rookery extends six miles along the shoreline near Point Piedras Blancas in the Hearst San Simeon State Park. The seals may be seen all year but the largest populations are present during late January, April and October. Visit the Friends of the Elephant Seal website at elephantseal.org for information about the best viewing times and spots.

#### The Hearst San Simeon State Park

The state park encompasses the Moonstone Beach, the Santa Rosa Creek Natural Preserve, the San Simeon Natural Preserve and the Pa-Nu Cultural Preserve.

 Santa Rosa Creek Preserve includes valuable riparian forests and coastal wetlands, that provide habitat for endangered Tidewater Goby.

• San Simeon Natural Preserve covers vast wetlands, riparian areas, and several undisturbed native plant communities and is a wintering site for monarch butterflies. • The 13.7 acre Pa-nu Cultural Preserve contains an archaeological site dated to 5850 years before the present era. The site holds significant evidence of prehistoric technology and life patterns.

A 3.3 mile trail runs through parts of the San Simeon Natural Preserve, with a portion of the trail being wheelchair accessible. The trail includes scenic overlooks, rest-stop benches and interpretive panels. The park address is 500 San Simeon Creek Road, Cambria. Call (805) 927-2010 for information about days and times the park is open.

#### **Nitt Witt Ridge**

This California Registered Historical Landmark #939 is famous for the artistic use of recycled materials used in its construction. Reclusive artist Arthur Harold Beal purchased the land in 1928 and spent the next 50 years creating his own version of a castle. Building materials include beer cans, concrete, washing machines, car parts, old stoves and abalone shells. Call (805) 927-2690 to arrange a tour.





# Zebras on the Central Coast? Hearst Castle's unexpected savanna sight

### From private zoo to wild herd, Hearst Castle's zebra story

A n unexpected sight often greets travelers along Highway 1 near the town of San Simeon - a herd of zebras. No, you haven't been transported to the African savannah; the herd is made up of the descendants of the former Hearst Castle private zoo.

Built in the early 20th century, the Hearst Garden of Comparative Zoology was the largest private zoo at the time. Constructed as part of the estate between 1919 and 1947 by publishing tycoon William Randolph Hearst and architect Julia Morgan, the estate featured a col-

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lection of caged animals and large enclosed spaces, providing habitats for animals including grizzly bears, lions, tigers, leopards, jaguars, orangutans, monkeys, an elephant, as well as the now iconic zebras.

In 1937, the financial struggles that Hearst met during the Great Depression forced the dismantling of the zoo. Many of the zoo's animal residents were donated to public zoos or sold to commercial establishments in California, Oregon, and Washington. However, the zebras' story took a different turn. The zebras remained confined within their enclosures until a winter storm hit, toppling the fences that once kept them captive. Seizing their newfound freedom, the zebras ventured forth into the vast 77,000acre expanse of the Hearst Ranch. The animals adapted and flourished in their new environment, increasing in population.

Fast forward to the present day, and an estimated 126 zebras now roam freely across the coastal grasslands. The zebras now graze alongside Hearst Ranch Beef cattle, a grass-fed cattle operation that



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has been managed by the Hearst Ranches since 1865. While the cattle are maintained by Hearst Ranch Beef and the land is managed by Hearst's Agricultural Operations, the zebras are now considered completely wild, meaning there is no entity managing, feeding or tracking the herd.

As they continue to thrive in the Hearst Ranch, these resilient creatures serve as a reminder of the enduring power of nature to reclaim its space.

#### How to catch sight of the herd

For visitors to Hearst Castle, the journey up the winding road now

offers more than just a glimpse of opulence and history.

While a zebra spotting is likely during a visit to the ranch from the roads, there is no guarantee that visitors will see the wild herd. A savvy traveler would be wise to bring binoculars for a closer look. Visitors are reminded not to try to approach the animals or trespass on the Hearst Ranch land. The herd is said to mostly roam from the northernmost point of the Hearst Castle Visitor Center to San Simeon Creek Road to the south and is often spotted on the east side of Highway 1, looking towards Hearst Castle.

A glimpse of the zebra herd makes for a memorable addition to a trip to the castle or the quaint nearby town of San Simeon.

Hearst Castle is open daily at 9 a.m. There are a number of different tours that visitors can choose from. For more information about a visit to Hearst Castle visit its website at hearstcastle.org or call 1 (800) 444-4445.



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# **Atascalero** Outdoor activities abound

he city of Atascadero, originally founded by E.G. Lewis in the early 1900s as a utopian community, is a popular location for shopping, dining and strolls along the lake shore. Home to the Charles Paddock Zoo, the town has a large selection of restaurants offering a range of cuisine from rib-sticking American style to Asian, Mediterranean and more. Breweries, wine tasting, bakeries, antique stores, specialty shops, boutiques and art galleries are tucked away in locations along the main El Camino Real and on side streets around the Sunken Gardens. Popular area wineries are only a short drive from downtown and any of the town's several hotels.

# Attractions

#### Atascadero Lake Park

A 1.3-mile easy walk path circles the lake in the park providing views of the lake, the many varieties of birds that frequent the lake and other visiting wildlife. Bring binoculars; more than 48 species of birds have been sighted at the lake and recorded on ebirds.org. Leashed dogs are allowed and the path is also a favorite place for cyclists. The park has restrooms, small barbecue and recreation areas. The Faces of Freedom Veterans Memorial occupies the edge of the park facing Morro



Road and is well worth a visit. The park is located at 9305 Pismo Ave, Atascadero just off of Morro Road (Highway 41).

#### **Charles Paddock Zoo**

The zoo is one of only 211 zoos accredited by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association, this zoo was founded in 1955 by Charles Paddock, a county park ranger who nursed injured wild animals back to health. Today, the zoo covers more than five acres. Many of the zoo residents are part of a world-wide program to preserve animals and their habitats. Some of these rare and endangered animals include the American Alligator and endangered owls and the Greater Roadrunner native to California. The zoo is located at 9100 Morro Rd, Atascadero. For hours and more information call (805) 461-5080 or visit charlespaddockzoo.org.

#### Golfing

Atascadero and North San Luis Obispo County has several challenging golf courses. Contact any of these golf courses directly for tee times and more information: Chalk Mountain Golf Course, Links Golf Course of Paso Robles, Paso Robles Golf Club, Hunter Ranch Golf Course and River Oaks Golf Course.

#### **Historic City Hall**

Atascadero's historic city hall is probably the city's best known historic building. Located at 6500 Palma Ave. and gracing the back of the Sunken Gardens, the double-domed Italian Renaissance building was originally constructed in 1914 as the Atascadero Administration Building. After founder E.G. Lewis declared bankruptcy the building was purchased in 1927 and, over the years, served as three different private schools and a bank. It became the Veterans Memorial Building when acquired by the County of San Luis Obispo in 1954, and served as a community building. When the City of Atascadero incorporated in 1979, government offices occupied the building until it suffered major damage in the 2003 San Simeon Earthquake. After years of reconstruction and restoration, Historic City Hall opened again in 2013.







# From lakeside walks to mountain summits, explore Atascadero's hidden trails

Family friendly, dog friendly, equestrian trails, and mountain biking

One of the better-kept local secrets is a trail system spread throughout the city of Atascadero that offers pleasantly surprising outdoor adventures. The trails range from easy strolls around the Atascadero Lake to a challenging four-hour trek that climbs to 1700 feet.

The terrain includes oak-covered foothills, cottonwood and willowlined waterways, grassy open spaces, and mountain and valley views. A variety of wildlife frequents the trail areas. Native California plants are plentiful.

There is a small parking fee for the Cerro Alto trails. The rest are free. Horses and dogs are allowed on most of the trails, as are bicycles. Trail etiquette and leash requirements ensure everyone's enjoyment.

#### **Stadium Park Trails**

Just under two miles, this easyto-difficult trail is open to equestrians, hikers, joggers, cyclists, and dogs. The trail passes through hills and native oak trees.

Directions: Exit to Morro Road (Highway 41) and head east to Capistrano Avenue. Turn left onto Capistrano Avenue, then right at the stop sign. The entrance is





on the right, just under the overpass.

#### Las Lomas Trail

A moderately difficult trail with two routes less than a mile long, travels through hillsides covered with native grasses, oak, and pine trees. The trail is open to hikers, joggers, cyclists, and dogs.

Directions: Exit at Santa Barbara Road. Head east, then left onto Alondra Road. The trailhead is on the left.

#### Jim Green Trail

This moderately difficult 1.5mile trail is open to equestrians, hikers, joggers, cyclists, and dogs. The trail overlooks Heilmann Park, follows the golf course then loops back through the oak forest.

Directions: Exit at Curbaril Avenue and drive east. Turn right onto Cortez Avenue to the parking lot.

#### **Cerro Alto Trails**

Two moderately difficult trails starting from the Cerro Alto Campground parking are open to equestrians, hikers, joggers, cyclists, and dogs. Each trail takes about 4 hours.

Directions: Entrance to Cerro Alto Campground is located on Highway 41, eight miles east of Morro Bay and 12 miles west of Atascadero.

#### Juan Bautista de Anza Trail— North

Almost six miles of easyto-modernly difficult trails are accessible from multiple trailheads. Easy-to-find trail markers provide directions. Open to equestrians, hikers, joggers, cyclists, and dogs.

Directions: Exit at Del Rio Road; head east and turn left at Potrero Road to Traffic Way. Trailheads are located along Traffic Way and Ferro Carril Road.

#### Juan Bautista de Anza Trail— South

An easy 1.7-mile trail provides abundant views of wildlife and native California vegetation. Open to equestrians, hikers, joggers, cyclists, and dogs.

Directions: Exit at Curbaril Avenue. Head east and turn right into the parking lot on Cortez Avenue.

#### **Atascadero Lake Park Trail**

An easy walk around Atascadero Lake that is open to hikers, bicyclists, joggers, and dogs. The trail has access to park facilities.

Directions: Exit at Morro Road (Highway 41). Head west on Morro Road 1.3 miles to the public parking on the left.

Santa Margarita is a taste of the old west. This settlement, easily reached from Highway 101 or Highway 58 is the gateway to Santa Margarita Lake and the Carrizo Plain National Monument. The small town quickly changes from the first impression of a sleepy western town to reveal surprising shops full of antiques, quirky garden art, plants, garden supplies, creative décor, restaurants serving up wholesome meals, and winery tasting rooms. The long history of Santa Margarita, from the ancestors of today's Chumash and Salinas people through the Spanish and Mexican land grants and early American settlers until today, is being researched and preserved by the Santa Margarita Historical Society.

### Attractions & Tours

#### Santa Margarita Lake

Follow Highway 58 to Santa Margarita Park to find the lake located in Santa Margarita Regional Park at 4695 A Santa Margarita Lake Road. Be sure to head out with a full tank of gas. The lake and park offer boating, fishing, hiking trails and picnicking. The park is located on several thousand acres of land designated as open space. #### The Carizzo Plains National Monument

The 250,000 acre Carrizo Plain National Monument is the largest surviving native California grasslands. The plains are reminiscent of Africa's Serengeti, providing the highest concentration of irreplaceable wildlife in California. To reach Carizzo Plain, take Highway 58 south from Santa Margarita to 17495 Soda Lake Rd.



# Templeton

empleton is the epitome of small town charm. Originally founded in 1886 as the last station on the southbound Southern Pacific Railroad, the town hosted horse drawn stagecoaches that met the trains and gave passengers a ride to San Luis Obispo to connect with the next stagecoach to their destinations. Even after the railroad extended the rails south to Santa Margarita in 1889, Templeton remained the shipping point for local crops and products bound eastward and to boats in shipping ports on the coast. Grain, wood, charcoal, fruit and cattle, driven from as far away as Kern County, arrived in Templeton for the next destination.

Many of the buildings from the late 1800s are still lining Main Street and housing unique shops, wineries and restaurants serving everything from hearty country breakfasts to dinner for every taste and the Templeton Historical Museum Society.



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# Templeton—a small town with a big history

Templeton is a quaint, sleepy village these days, but at one time, the town was a busy center for travelers and commerce. In the 1800s, the arrival of the railroad turned small towns into economic hubs, and Templeton was no exception to that prosperity.

Spain and the mission padres were the first to introduce agriculture to California, displacing the original Salinan people in the process. When Spain was driven out, the Mexican government sold or granted the Spanish ranchos to loyal friends and supporters. That's how brothers Daniel and James Blackburn, along with Lazard Godchaux, came into possession of the land in 1857.

The founding of Templeton in 1886 coincided with the arrival of the Southern Pacific Railroad. Templeton was the last station headed south. Passengers traveling elsewhere boarded stagecoaches that took them to San Luis Obispo to catch another outbound stagecoach.

Reports are that within 90 days, the town added three hotels, three general stores, a drug store, two blacksmith shops, five saloons, a billiard parlor, a lumber yard, two barber shops, a public hall, a post office, and around 30 homes. In 1889, Southern Pacific extended the railroad south to Santa Margarita and moved the railroad station. Templeton remained a shipping center for grain, wood, charcoal, fruit, and cattle to be transported by train to markets across the nation.

#### Why the name 'Templeton?'

Someone suggested naming the town Crocker after Charles F.



Crocker, the Vice President of the Southern Pacific Railroad. Crocker chose the name Templeton after his two-year-old son. Templeton, whose full name was Charles Templeton Crocker, became quite well known.

Templeton was responsible for establishing the California Historical Society as a permanent organization in 1922. He also wrote the first American opera to be produced in Europe, "The Land of Happiness" or "Fey-Yen-Fah," and is credited with popularizing Art Deco in America.

Templeton funded expeditions with academic institutions aboard his personal yacht, the Zaca. In 1930, he sailed around the world, memorializing the adventure in his book, "The Cruise of the Zaca." He sold the Zaca to the United States Navy in 1940. The Zaca was later pur-

chased by Errol Flynn, who released a documentary with the same title as Crocker's book about a 1946 collection trip taken with his father, marine biologist Professor Theodore Flynn.

#### **Preserving history**





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# We're off to the races at the 2025 California Mid-State Fair

Top-name entertainment, exhibits, competitions, carnival, and fun for the entire family

The 2025 California Mid-State Fair is the place to be this summer. Starting July 16, the fair brings 12 days of exhibits, competitions, concerts, and good old-fashioned fun to town. There's a special vibe at the fair, and its many different zones create unique experiences for all attendees.

"We are all about the fun, and our fair is almost like a reunion," fair CEO Colleen Bojorquez says. "There are some people who don't see each other all year until the fair comes around, and it's a time to catch up and have a great time together."

This year's theme is Off to the Races! Bojorquez explained that the theme is a nod to the history of fairs and horse racing. "Fairs have a longstanding tie to horse racing, and our 2025 theme gives off derby vibes. Organized horse racing in California started at fairs in the 1850s. In the 1930s, fairs supported legislation



to legalize horse racing and in return received funding from wagering which, although our fair no longer receives any of this, it is still a funding source at many other fairs."

### Rodeo, livestock, and top-tier entertainment

The Country Rodeo Finals brings rodeo lovers from all around the country to Paso Robles. Enjoy performances from dozens of local cowboys and cowgirls, many of whom are top tier in the state.



"Attending the rodeo is a way for SLO County residents to connect to our rural roots and be proud of our heritage, and it's become a favorite for out-of-towners as well," she added. "The junior gymkhana

events are great for the younger crowds."

Local 4-H and FFA exhibitors take over the livestock area, learning from each other and interacting with the public. Raising and attending to their animals in the months leading up to the fair teaches

students about responsibility, animal care, communication, teamwork, mentorship, record keeping, financial and public speaking skills, sportsmanship, market dynamics, and more. "The Livestock Area is the heart of every fair," Bojorquez said. "Ours is covered and a fun place to stroll, even if you just want to see cute animals. The livestock auctions take place here, and it's where almost ev-



erv fair kid's memories are made." The Chumash Grandstand Arena brings talented musicians and performers to the fair year after year. The fair upped the fun factor in recent years by adding a hospital-



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# FOSO, the newest installation at Sensorio, combines light, music, technology, and nature

### An enchanting fiber optic symphonic orchestra

Sensorio debuted a new experiential art installation in early April 2025. Created by UK artist Bruce Munro, FOSO combines light, music, technology, and nature in an immersive experience. Visitors can experience a walk through a symphony of light and sound created by 32 fiber optic columns of light synchronized to an original score by award-winning composer Nainita Desai.

FOSO joins previous installations that are illuminating the venue's 35 acres for a complete sensory immersion experience. This latest installation promises to be as enchanting as all of the installations at Sensorio.

#### **Dimensions by Hybycozo**

Sensorio commemorated its fifth anniversary in May 2024 with the debut of the Dimensions immersive art exhibition. This exhibit, in development for three years by Los Angeles-based artists Hybycozo, is a collaborative venture between Serge Beaulieu and Yelena Filipchuk, renowned worldwide for creating monumental geometric metal sculptures. The exhibit showcases expansive geometric metal sculptures for visitors to explore as they are enveloped by shifting lights and music in a continuous 33-minute spectacle.



# Meet ghosts, horses, and maybe your favorite celebrity at Paso Robles' quirkiest watering hole

The Pine Street Saloon is rooted in Paso Robles' history

Before "Beer for My Horses" hit the country music charts, the Pine Street Saloon was already serving horses and their riders. The Pioneer Day parade, held annually in October, unofficially ends at the Pine Street Saloon, where, for the past 40some years, horses are ridden right up to the bar. Saloon owner Ron French said, "People get a real kick out of it, and how often do you get to have a beer with a horse?"

Sharing a beer with a horse isn't the only thing that sets this bar apart. You might find yourself bending an elbow with a ghost. Regulars talk about noises and things moving. "I don't believe in ghosts," said French. "It's an old, creaky, wooden building." Nevertheless, he set up night-vision cameras and has video footage of glowing "supercharged dust particles" zipping through glass and around the room, and lamps and a vacuum cleaner moving across the floor. A few years ago, the rumors of hauntings earned the Pine Street Saloon an episode on the Travel Channel's hit show. The Dead Files. The Travel Channel returned to film a new episode for Ghost Adventures that was released around the end of 2021.

The saloon has been in the family since it was purchased by French's mother, Pat, in 1971. Built around 1857, the saloon had a reputation as a bordello and visits by Jesse James. Drury James, one of Paso Robles' founders, was Frank and Jesse's uncle. The Pine Street Saloon has been voted the "Best North County Bar" in the New Times 'Best of SLO County."

#### No-nonsense drinks, live music, entertainment, and safe rides home

"We have daily drink specials and serve lots of beer, Jack and Coke," said French. "We can make foo-foo drinks, but they're not very popular here."

The saloon is cash-only, but there's an ATM. The décor is rustic. There are pool tables, and the jukebox plays two kinds of music: country and western. A food trailer serves on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights.

Karaoke, Open Mic, and live music guarantee a good time. "About 10 local bands play here on a rotating schedule. Once in a while, we mix in out-of-town acts, and sometimes we are just surprised!" said French. "Pink has dropped in to sing Karaoke. Merle Haggard was a regular, even recorded a commercial for us a few months before he died. I haven't aired it out of respect."

The saloon has attracted Paula Nelson (Willie's daughter), Kacey Musgraves, Kenny Lee Lewis, Travis Howard, Ramblin' Jack Elliott, Louie Ortega, actors Gary Busey and Robert Carradine, Jason Lee, and Benedict Cumberbatch.

Live music, karaoke, open mic, or other entertainment starts at 9 p.m. on various nights throughout the week. Call (805) 238-1114 for more information.

The saloon's limo offers free safe rides on Friday and Saturday nights anywhere in the city limits. Tips for the driver, please! "If you don't have a designated driver and can't afford a cab, we want to make sure you get safely home," said French.



# Savor the flavor: Taste local premium olive oils

Olive oil tasting involves smelling the aroma of an oil, and then sipping it to taste its positive attributes. Official tasters drink the oil from dark blue glasses, to ensure they can't see the color of the olive oil (and be influenced by an oil's green or gold color).

#### Look for three qualities

Tasters should look for these three positive attributes:

**Fruitiness:** Any positive organic smell or taste.

**Bitterness:** A sign of freshness that is usually tasted on the sides of the tongue.

**Pungency:** A peppery, burning sensation in the throat.

Not all olive oils have all three of the attributes, but some should be present.Try it for yourself!! Grab that bottle you've had in the pantry for ages, and taste it to see if it's still good. Pour some into a wine glass– about an inch or two high – cover the glass with one hand while warming the base of the glass with the other. Place your nose into the glass after a minute and breathe in. Does it smell fruity, like green apples, cut grass, or tomato leaf? Great! Or does it smell unpleasant, like paint thinner, bacon, or a musty cellar? In that case, it's probably defective and should be thrown out.

Next, slurp in about a quarter of a teaspoon and let it sit on your tongue while you breathe in. Finally, swallow a bit and look for any signs of pepper in the throat. If an oil has a greasy feeling on your tongue, it's probably past its prime.



Remember, olive oil is a fresh product, much like a fruit juice. It needs to be used within 24 months of when it's made, and it needs to be used within a few months of opening the bottle.





Upon learning that their friends preferred their oils, what started as a hobby soon blossomed into a passion. Since then, the farm has grown to 50 acres of Certified Organic groves, and includes varieties such as bosana from Sardinia and hojiblanca from Spain. Every tree is planted, cared for, and picked by hand. The Millers are passionate about environmentally-conscious farming, refrain from using toxic pesticides or fertilizers, practice beekeeping, and also grow lavender. Expanding the olive trees from 5000 to 20,000 is also in the plans.



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# Brecon Estate vineyard is recognized as a 'visionary planting'

Cave-exploring background influenced the owner's winemaking

When they first toured the location, Damian and Amanda Grindley recognized something special about the vineyards that would eventually become Brecon Estate. Originally established in 1971 by wine pioneer Art Norman, the vineyard is now regarded as a visionary planting and was recently certified as "Historic" by the Historic Vineyard Society (HVS). This exclusive designation for preserving California's oldest vines includes vinevards such as Chalone, Dusi, HMR, and Pesenti, along with Macdonald, Ridge, and Monte Bello in the northern part of the state.

Established in 2011, HVS works to preserve California's historic vineyards. Brecon Estate is proud to be the steward of one of the few historic vineyards in Paso Robles.

Grindley brought over 25 years of experience from winemaking regions in Australia, Europe, and the United States to Brecon Estate. When it came to naming the winery, he and his wife, Amanda, chose to venerate the Brecon Beacons in Grindley's native Wales. "Before I got into the wine industry, I explored, mapped, and discovered quite a few caves in the Brecon Beacons of the wild, windswept Brecon Beacons National Park, which is underlain by a big band of limestone." Caving is how Damian and Amanda met.



Before settling in the area, the Grindleys looked long and hard for their ideal property. "Being a cave explorer, I couldn't buy a winery that wasn't on calcareous soil," Grindley said. "When I return to the caves of my youth, I literally get a tingling down my neck from the limestone. I get the same feeling here. Plus, I have cool British blood, so we were trying to get as close to the ocean as possible for that cooling influence of the fog with our roots in a south-facing slope in calcareous soil. Some of the best regions in the world are planted

on calcareous soil. If you like wines from calcareous soil, the minerality, the great acids, and the aging ability, Paso is ground zero." With the help of friends, Simon and Anna Hackett of Australia, the Grindleys started Brecon Estate in 2012.

#### Celebrating recognition with a limited-edition release

When Brecon's old-vine cabernet sauvignon crossed the 50-year mark, it became eligible for recognition by the Historic Vineyard Society. In celebration of the recognition, Brecon Estate has released its most recent vintage from these historic vines. Only 235 cases of the 2022 Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon were produced, and this limited-edition wine is available at Brecon's Paso Robles tasting room.

The 2022 Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon joins the long list of Brecon Estate award-winning wines. Awards include Best of Show at the Sunset International Wine Competition, Boston Wine Competition, and the International Women's Wine Competition, and Forbes' list of top 25 wineries of the year.

"The trick," said Grindley, "is having everything you make be good across the board, and that's harder than making one great wine. It's also about not growing too quickly, and keeping those small, interesting parcels."

For that reason, guests will likely find a different lineup of wines at each tasting room visit. Grindley makes 12-14 small parcel wines per year. "We always have new releases," he said. "The tasting lineup changes at least once a month."

"We are all about being good neighbors, using water wisely, and being part of the Paso Robles community, Riboli said. "This is our second home, and the longer we've been involved in the area, the more we've invested not only in resources but our time."

This sense of community was established by Santo Cambianica when he first started San Anto-

nio Winery in Los Angeles more than 108 years ago. His nephew Stefano Riboli and his bride, Maddalena, later owned the winery and passed the family work ethic on to their three children – Santo, Cathy, and Steve. Today, the fourth generation includes Anthony Riboli (head winemaker), Chris Riboli, Dante

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Riboli Colombatti, Jennifer Riboli Converse, Blake Anderson, and David Riboli, who hold various positions within the company. Stefano and Maddalena have both passed on, leaving a legacy that will endure for several more generations.

"Stefano was our family patriarch, and we raise a toast to his 97 years of a great life," Riboli said. "We all miss him, but we are honored to carry on his incredible legacy." Maddalena passed away shortly after her 102nd birthday.

## The science and art of winemaking

As a winemaker, Anthony Riboli puts a lot of heart and history into every batch of wine he produces.

"What I've always loved about winemaking is the combination of science and art," he said. "That combination is what got me hooked. Every winemaker has a dif-

ferent approach, just like a painter or sculptor, and I find that to be truly amazing."

Riboli, a former pre-med student, works alongside winemaker Marty Spate. The Riboli Family estate vineyards in Paso Robles include Maddalena, Stefano, Stefano II, and Pretty Penny vineyards in the El Pomar District AVA, Creston Highlands and Riboli Creston vineyards in the Creston District AVA, and newly acquired Jada Vineyards and Winery and Riboli Willow Creek vineyard(AL in the Willow Creek District AVA. They also have four vineyard properties in the Arroyo Seco and Santa Lucia Highlands AVAs of Monterey and the Rutherford appellation of Napa Valley.

"What I like most about having our own vineyards is learning about the individual vineyards each year," he said. "I can have a better experiential factor in the winemaking, which I believe is important. The longer we work with these vineyards, the more we know them, and that's really exciting."



#### Wine pairings

Riboli shared some tips on pairing his family wines with a variety of popular food items.

"My go-to wine is our San Simeon Pinot Noir. Whether served with turkey, ham, prime rib, or salmon, it's just so versatile," Riboli said. "For people who want a bigger, bolder red wine with prime rib, the San Simeon Cabernet Sauvignon is fantastic. The Opaque Darkness, our red blend, is so smooth on the palette."

Lighter foods and appetizers pair with the San Simeon Sauvignon Blanc, according to Riboli, so be sure to pick up a few bottles of this bright, refreshing wine. "Rosé is very popular right now and there's a lot of flexibility to pair these wines with many different foods," Riboli said. "Our Maddalena Rosé is a nice blend, and our San Simeon Grenache Rosé is quite popular. Both of these wines go well with shrimp and other appetizers, and lighter entrees, including salmon and turkey. Our La Quinta Syrah Port is just fantastic with a flourless chocolate cake," he said. "The sparkling red, semi-sweet Stella Rosa Rosso Lux, from our

Stella Rosa Rosso Lux, from our Italian import label, is a blend of barbera and brachetto, and just an incredible dessert wine. If your palate likes a sweeter style of wine, it also pairs well with turkey, ham, and lighter dishes."

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# Bruce Hansen and the wine roadshow that put Paso Robles on the map

'We loaded our wine in the trunk of the car, and off we went'

There was a time back in the 1990s when few people outside of the area knew about Paso Robles wine. "So a bunch of us decided to take our wines on the road and introduce them to the rest of the country," said Bruce Hansen, founder and winemaker of Hansen Vineyards. "We picked an area, found someplace where we could pour wine like a hotel or some event, loaded the wine in the trunk of the car, and off we'd go."

The group made three or four trips a year between 2003 and 2009 to locations in California, Las Vegas, Phoenix, Dallas, and the East Coast. "Sometimes we flew, but most of the time we drove," Bruce said.

Rich Hartnberger, founder and winemaker of Midnight Cellars, Doug Kruse of Jack Creek Cellars, Danny Panico of Dover Canyon Winery, and Joe Barton of Grey Wolf Barton Family Wines, came immediately to Bruce's mind when talking about the wine roadshow.

Rich Hartenberger reports, "These trips were critical to spread the word. Paso was virtually unknown back then, and people were very open to learning about this new, exciting wine region!" He adds, "Of course, Justin Baldwin, Tobin James, Gary Eberle, and Art Norman, among many others, led the way for all of us newcomers."

## Building wineries and creating wine

Traveling for wine was nothing new to Bruce. Before starting Hansen Vineyards, he made a living building winery and vineyard buildings. "I must have built around

500 different buildings for wineries from California up into Oregon," he said. "Yes. I built everything here, too, from our home to the Cab House, and the rest."

Bruce Hansen's personal history with winemaking goes back to his childhood in Michigan. "Dad made wine at home and I helped him, which didn't make Mom happy," he reports. As an adult, he picked up winemaking tips and lessons from the various winemakers he worked with when constructing their winery buildings.

The friendships he made during his construction years helped launch Hansen Vineyards & Winery. When the time came for him to make wine, he bought a former almond orchard in 1992. After ripping out the old trees, he started planting rootstock, which has become 30 acres of 10 to 20-year-old vines growing mostly cabernet sauvignon grapes. Hansen Vineyards 2001 Cabernet Sauvignon was his first release.

"I had some great mentors," said Bruce as he listed off names including Gary Eberle, Craig Reed, now at Castoro Cellars, Alan Kinne,

winemaker at Martin & Weyrich, and Christian Roguenant, now at Lightpost Winery in Morgan Hill.

Since its first release, Hansen Vineyard & Winery has become known for excellent, awardwinning wines. Bruce oversees everything with precise detail, from planting, growing, and harvesting to barrels, fermentation, and bottling.

The vines grow in soil consisting mainly of nutrient-rich black adobe with an abundance of shale and limestone. The wines are aged in 100% French Oak barrels for two and a half to four and a half years, accounting for the amazing results and the reason the wine is so drinkable shortly after being bottled. He produces around 1500 cases a year.

Hansen wines were awarded gold and silver medals at the 2024 American Fine Wine Competition. The Hansen Cab House 2019 Cabernet Franc and the Hansen Cab House 2021 Cabernet Franc both won gold medals. The Hansen Cab House 2017 Cabernet Sauvignon and Hansen Cab House 2018 Cab-



ernet Sauvignon both won silver medals.



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


