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


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














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
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Welcome to San Luis Obispo County. We are glad you have chosen to visit. A fixture within our community is the Diablo Canyon Power Plant (DCPP). DCPP is a nuclear power plant that generates approximately 10% of California's electricity. Both PG&E and the County of San Luis Obispo have developed detailed emergency plans that would be used in the unlikely event that an emergency were to occur at DCPP.

POWER PLANT

If a serious emergency were to occur that would require you to take action, the County would sound the Early Warning System sirens. The sirens are an indication to tune to a local radio or television station for emergency information and instructions.


When at sea, tune to Marine Channel 16.

The siren system is tested regularly throughout the year and may be used for any local emergency.

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

There are many things to discover around SLO

The city of San Luis Obispo has much to see and do. It is the seat of county government, a popular dining and shopping destination and a traditional college town reflecting eclectic choices in art, entertainment, food and activities.

Attractions

The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa Mission

The San Luis Obispo de Tolosa mission is one of the best known historical sites in town. Founded by Father Junipero Serra in September 1772, the mission was the fifth of the California missions and named after Saint Louis, Bishop of Toulouse, France. For information about tours and the gardens or attending mass visit missionsanluisobispo.org.

Historical buildings

Other historical buildings, many featuring unique architecture, include the Sinsheimer store with an iron front built in 1884 at 849 Monterey St., the Jack House at 536 Marsh Street, which was built in 1875, the State Historical Landmark Dallidet Adobe at 1185 Pacific St and the 1884 Ah Louis Store at 800 Palm St, originally a supply station for the Chinese laborers who built the railroad tunnels through the mountains of the Cuesta Grade.

The historic Carnegie Library on Monterey Street is home to the History Center of San Luis Obispo. Built in 1905, the library is one in a chain of over 1600 libraries funded by the United States by Scottish-American businessman and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. The SLO Carnegie Museum is one of three still standing and in use on the Central Coast. The other two are located in Lompoc and Paso Robles.

San Luis Obispo Botanical Gardens

Gardeners and outdoor enthusiasts are not left out. The San Luis Obispo Botanical gardens, on Highway 1 near Dairy Creek Road is the only garden in the United States exclusively featuring plants and ecosystems from the five Mediterranean climates in the world. The design includes miles of paved trails and shady resting spots and a variety of other activities.

Hiking and cycling

The city's Parks and Recreation Department operates several parks that span 7000 acres of breathtaking views and hiking trails. Visit the website for the City of San Luis Obispo for park maps details about the ease or difficulty of the trails.

The city has over 75 miles of bike paths and what better way for cycling enthusiasts to enjoy a vacation. San Luis Obispo was designated a Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists in 2007. Visit bikeslocounty.org for cycling maps for the City of San Luis Obispo, wine trails and other locations in San Luis Obispo County.





San Luis Obispo offers some of the best and most varied museums in the area for history, art, local culture, events, and activities for all ages. Each museum provides a special view of the region's history and culture. In San Luis Obispo, there's a museum for every interest.

San Luis Obispo Museum of Art

Every experience at SLOMA delivers a unique view of the artistic and creative side of the region's lifestyle and interests. Exhibits include all manner of artwork, paintings, sculpture, photography, fine crafts, and a permanent collection that defines the roles of artists who are important to the local region and California. Along with the exhibits, community programs include films, concerts, art talks, and educational programs. Admission is free to the museum, but there may be an admission fee for some of the events and activities.

The Art Museum is located at 1010 Broad St, San Luis Obispo, and is open from 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Thursday-Monday, open for school and group tours only Tue-Wed. Closed on major holidays. History Center of San Luis Obispo County

The History Center of San Luis Obispo County has been a favorite place for historians for more than 60 years. Vast collections of correspondence, newspapers, directories, maps, and photographs are resources for historical and genealogical research in San Luis Obispo County. The exhibits are opportunities to explore the history of the area as it leads to today's lifestyles and cultures.

Central Coast Veterans Memorial Museum

The Veteran's Museum honors all veterans of all generations, with emphasis on those from the Central Coast. The collections and displays include military artifacts from WWI to today, historical memorabilia, and a research library. The Central Coast Veterans Memorial Museum is the only Central Coast site certified by the Library of Congress for recording interviews for the Veterans History Project.

The San Luis Obispo Children's Museum

The San Luis Obispo Children's Museum was created to provide a fun place for children and families to explore, discover, and learn through hands-on exhibits and programs. Three floors and an outside playscape are jam-packed with exhibits for children ages two to ten. Unique educational programs and activities are scheduled throughout each week.

San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum

The San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum has it all, from the first narrow-gauge Pacific Coast Railway that carried people and goods from Avila to San Luis

Obispo, through the arrival of the Southern Pacific Railroad in 1896, to modern times. The exhibits include a variety of railroad cars and railroad equipment, including a 1926 Pullman observation car. 





 Chumash Park covers 38-acres of wetlands, willows, oaks and is home to a rich variety of birds and wildlife. Bring a camera. Leashed dogs are welcome.

- Eldwayen Ocean Park meanders over a mile along the bluffs and has stairs down to the beach and the tidepools. Check a tide chart to visit during low tide to explore the tidepools.
- Margo Dodd Park, located on a bluff above the ocean includes breathtaking panoramas of the ocean, beaches and surrounding areas. Bring binoculars and a camera. Walk the sandy beach to a tidepool at the end of Pier Street.

Hiking and scenic walks at the Pismo Preserve

The preserve provides over 11 miles of trails wandering through 880-acres of oak woodlands and coastal ridges and some of the most stunning panoramic views of the Pacific Ocean and surrounding land and beaches. Trails are marked for the direction of travel. Park is open weekdays from sunup to sunset.

Price Historical Park



Any trip to the beach is incomplete without a bowl of clam chowder or a plate of fresh fish and chips. It seems like restaurants are opening and closing at an alarming pace, but Pismo Fish and Chips has been an institution in Pismo Beach since the early 1960s. It started when the Zechner family immigrated to America from Holland in 1959. They did odd jobs around town and even received help from a local church. With \$500, Ann Zechner opened a fresh fish market across from the




restaurant's current location. She had no experience running a fish market, but that didn't matter. It was a success!

Her husband, Jack Zechner, who was helping in the market, found a wallet nearby with \$900 inside (for context, the minimum wage was \$1.00 per hour in 1962). He immediately called the man who had lost his wallet. Of course, the man was grateful and offered a large reward, but Jack refused. The man turned out to be the local bank president, and he told Jack to call if he ever needed help.

Well, the Zechners wanted to open a restaurant, but couldn't raise the money they needed. They tried everything with no success. Then, Jack contacted the bank president, who gave them the loan even











though they didn't qualify for it. Jack's good deed paid off because they opened Pismo Fish and Chips in 1963 with that loan, and the rest is history.

Little has changed inside the restaurant since 1963. The mural of Holland is still on the wall, and diners sit in cozy booths. Many of the employees have been there for decades, and the recipes that people lined up for in the 1960s are the same recipes that are served today.

The restaurant stayed in the family until 2014, when Karishma and Arpan Smith bought it.

The Smiths appreciate the rich history of the restaurant and are dedicated to keeping it the same as it's always been. Karishma Smith said, "Every day we hear stories from our customers about how they have been coming here since the 60s or 70s, and now they bring in their grandkids. It has become a family tradition to come here every time they are in Pismo, and they have so many

memories built in this place over the years."

The Smiths keep the menu current with their new specials, but the traditional menu relies on the recipes from the 1960s. Karishma states, "We are known for our Wild Caught Alaskan Cod Fish and Chips. Each order is hand-cut and hand-dipped in our signature tempura-style batter and made fresh per order." Of course, the menu has more than just fish and chips. Diners can have a bowl of chowder, a hamburger, a salad, grilled fish, or even crab legs and lobster. They have a little bit of everything!


Since its opening in 1996, the gallery has built countless relationships with collectors and tourists alike, offering a quiet cultural reprieve from the busyness of Pismo Beach.

"Come on in," Smith said. The doors are open, and Kinkade's lightfilled "window for the imagination" is there for you to explore in Pismo Beach, California.




Lopez Lake Recreation Area

Exploring nature near Arroyo Grande



Vacations are always better with adventure, exploring and experiencing nature. The Arroyo Grande countryside is some of the most beautiful in the region, and there are miles of hiking, biking, and equestrian trails less than 20 minutes from Arroyo Grande Village.

The Lopez Lake Recreation Area trailheads are easily accessible from campgrounds or designated parking. Nearly 20 leashed dog-friendly trails, varying from easy to challenging, offer spectacular scenery and wildlife sightings for the entire family.

Every trail offers memorable nature experiences from strolls through meadows and oaks to brilliant and exotic wildflowers on view in the springtime. Native California grasses and plants are a delight, including fragrant salvia and artemisia shrubs. Watch for the poison oak!

Wildlife includes more than 150 species of birds, including wild turkeys, eagles, hawks, condors, deer, sightings of coyotes, foxes, rabbits, and other small mammals, lizards, and snakes, including rattlesnakes!

Bring your cell phone, camera, and binoculars. Climbing a trail and cresting a hill offers panoramas of the lake, foothills, and meadows. Each trail is an adventure, and there are some easy walks near the lake.

Getting there

Take Huasana Road to Lopez Road and into the Lopez Lake Recreation Area. Along with hiking, the recreation area offers boating, fishing, and camping, including an equestrian camp. The marina at the lake has a convenience store, restaurant, and snack bar.

There is a day-use fee, payable at the entrance kiosk at the campground entrance, or make reservations online at slocountyparks.com.

Nipomo is a small town on the mesa in the southern area of San Luis Obispo County that is known for its stands of eucalyptus trees, expansive golf courses and special outdoor and nature experiences.

Nipomo preserves a spirit of true frontier land even while modern businesses thrive in its commercial areas. Standing on the wet sand of the shore of the Pacific, looking out over the sprawling Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes toward the rich, riparian woods, creeks, fresh water lakes and the Santa Maria River, one imagines seeing the same views that the original Chumash saw while going about their daily activities. The word "nipomo" means "base of the hills" in the Chumash language.

Bostonian sea captain, Captain William G. Dana acquired a land grant in 1837, and settled the 37,888-acre Rancho Nipomo. His adobe house still stands near the 101 Freeway.

Attractions

Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes

The 3,400-acre Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve is one of the largest remaining coastal dune systems in the nation and is a mustsee excursion for hikers, naturalists and bird-watchers. Catch glimpses of more than 200 varieties of birds and view more than 120 imperiled plants and animals within the preserve's National Wildlife Refuge and surrounding dune habitat.

Nipomo Native Gardens

A forest of native plants and trees are maintained by volunteers from the Nipomo Native Gardens Society. The Nipomo Native Garden is a 12-acre site located between Pomeroy, Camino Caballo and Osage, nipomonativegarden.org.

Nipomo Swap Meet

The huge Nipomo Swap Meet and Flea market is on the grounds adjacent to the 101 Freeway at the Teft Street off-ramp. The Nipomo Swap Meet & Flea market combines great family entertainment with old school swap meet atmosphere. It is the largest swap meet on California's Central Coast and is open Sunday only 6 a.m. - 4 p.m. \$4 Parking. No dogs. Visit nipomoswapmeets.com or call (805) 929-7000 for more information.

Dana Adobe Historical Landmark and Cultural Center

The mission of the Dana Adobe Cultural Center is to engage visitors with the stories of California's Rancho Era History, connecting them with the peoples, the land and its resources to foster environmental stewardship and cultural understanding. 

os Osos, Spanish for "the bears", is off the beaten path and the gateway to Montana de Oro, an amazing state park along the ocean. Ranch Cañada de Los Osos, meaning "Valley of the Bears," was a Mexican land grant initially granted to Victor Linares in 1842 by Governor Juan B. Alvarado. The town of Los Osos has many quaint places of interest for visitors to stop on their way to and from the state park. Try one of the many restaurants or grab something to take with you for a picnic at the beach or one of the nearby forests.

Montaña de Oro State Park

The park is well-used with daily visitors throughout the year who go there to hike, picnic, fish, camp, surf, take a dip in the ocean, or visit the tide pools. The park's visitor center is located at Spooner's Ranch House Museum above Spooner's Cove. The park is open from 6 a.m.-10 p.m. and is free to enter. Details: (805) 772-6101, or parks.ca.gov.

El Moro Elfin Forest

El Moro Elfin Forest in Los Osos is a 90-acre natural area in the San Luis Obispo County Parks and California State Parks systems. Its plant communities include coastal brackish marsh, riparian woodland fringe, pygmy oak woodland, maritime chaparral, and coastal dune scrub. The Elfin Forest supports more than 200 species of plants, as well as 110 kinds of birds, 22 species of mammals, and 13 species of reptiles and amphibians. It is home to rare plants, butterflies, snails, and birds. Chumash middens occur throughout the forest. There is a short, wheelchair accessible boardwalk loop that also protects sensitive habitat. Guided walks are conducted every third Saturday, reservations required. The forest is managed by the Friends of El Moro Elfin Forest. Details: elfinforest.org, (805) 528-0392.

Baywood Pier

The pier, at the intersection of 2nd Street and El Morro Ave., overlooks the shores of the back bay of Morro Bay. The Los Osos Oaks State Reserve Half-mile east of South Bay Boulevard on the south side of Los Osos Valley Road. The reserve has an easy one-mile trail through the "Pygmy Oaks", which are dwarfed coast live oaks. The low canopy reserve is on the site where Chumash once lived.

Los Osos Community Park

Located at the corner of Los Osos Valley Road and Palisades Avenue, the park includes a 17,000-square-foot skate park, three tennis courts, playgrounds and restrooms. The park is ideal for walking or picnicking and is the site of the Los Osos Valley School, one of five original one-room schoolhouses between San Luis Obispo and the coast. Of those five, only two still exist today, both in Los Osos.

Sweet Springs Nature Preserve

Located on the north end of Ramona Avenue between Broderon and 4th Street, the park is open from dawn to dusk and has trails that wander through the Monterey cypress and eucalyptus trees around two freshwater ponds and a salt marsh to the edge of Morro Bay.

Baywood Park Farmers' Market

On Santa Maria Avenue between 2nd and 3rd streets. The market takes place every Monday from 2-4:30 p.m. (805) 748-1109.

Bear statues

On your way into Los Osos notice the large grizzlies stationed as guards into the town at South Bay Boulevard and Los Osos Valley Road. The statues were created by local artist Paula Zima.

Birdwatching in winter? Thousands of birds are migrating

San Luis Obispo County is a hotspot on the Pacific Flyway

The Pacific Flyway is a major migratory route for billions of birds that travel between their breeding and overwintering grounds. The route stretches from Alaska to Patagonia, South America. Birdwatching during migration is the chance to see birds that most of us never see otherwise.

It's no accident that hundreds of people also migrate to SLO County every January to participate in the Morro Bay Bird Festival. Another group that spearheads birdwatching activities is the Morro Coast Audubon Society (MCAS). There are plenty of opportunities for excellent birdwatching, so pack up the kids, binoculars, cameras, a picnic, and head out! Best to leave the dogs at home; many wildlife sanctuaries and preserves don't allow dogs.

Sweet Springs Nature Preserve in Los Osos is one of the top bird-watching locations in SLO County. Birds that can be seen at Sweet Springs Nature Preserve include a rich variety of water birds and shore birds, bald eagles, ospreys, hawks, hummingbirds, woodpeck-

ers, and many bird species some of us may have never seen before.

With 464 bird species documented in SLO County, and individual birds numbering in the thousands, there's no reason to stay home!

Birdwatching on the coast

For easy-to-reach locations in addition to the Sweet Springs Preserve, check out Oso Flaco Lake in Oceano. Favorite spots in Morro Bay are the marina boardwalk and Morro Rock. Farther north, visit Estero Bluffs State Park in Cayucos,

the Harmony Headlands in San Simeon, and the Fiscalini Ranch Preserve near Cambria.

Birdwatching inland

For great inland locations, check out Meadow Park, El Chorro Park, or Laguna Lake in San Luis Obispo. The Bob Jones Trail at Avila Beach and Atascadero Lake in Atascadero are also easy-to-get-to locations.

Getting to know the birds

Learning to identify each unique species can range from curiosity about what's in your backyard

to trips to observe birds in their natural habitats.

Joining a group is a fun way to learn and make new friends. The MCAS offers several monthly bird walks, beginner workshops, and in-depth learning classes. The 2026 Morro Bay Bird Festival is scheduled for January 15–19, offering five days packed with special birdwatching opportunities, events, and presentations by leading ornithologists and naturalists.

Learn more about the Morro Coast Audubon Society at montereyaudubon.org, and the Morro Bay Bird Festival at morrobaybirdfestival.org.

If you're not into bundling up on cold days, spring and summer are nesting seasons when birders look forward to returning birds that have been gone all winter. Nesting season is an excellent opportunity to watch and learn. Species you might see include the hooded oriole, Bullock's oriole, black-headed grosbeak, cliff swallow, tree swallow, and Allen's hummingbird.



Explore the natural beauty of Morro Bay, a town famous for its fog and fishing. Whether for a day or a week, this small town by the Rock has something for everyone.

Morro Bay is bursting with exciting activities to try. There's deep sea fishing, whale watching, world-class surfing, hiking, biking, and kayaking.

When it comes to birdwatching, there's little doubt that Morro Bay provides the best chance for observing a great variety of species. It's an incredible birding spectacle. There are also harbor seals, sea lions, and sea otters.

Looking to take a slower pace?
Stroll down the Embarcadero and browse gift shops and art galleries. Explore the local cuisine and dine on fresh caught fish. Sit on a bench in Tidelands Park and watch the boats leaving the harbor or take a walk on the beach and watch the waves. Walk out the harbor boardwalk to Morro Rock, the 576-foot

volcanic plug that looms over the bay and seashore. Keep an eye out for sea otters that rest in the kelp beds near the shore.

Attractions

Morro Bay Maritime Museum

This museum has been preserving and interpreting the maritime history, especially that of California since 1995. The current fleet on exhibit includes the tug boat "Alma" that rescued sailors from the December 1941 Japanese attack on a Union Oil tanker off the coast of Morro Bay and the "Avalon," one of two Deep Submergence Rescue Vehicles (DSRV) submarines designed to rescue crews of downed submarines. The museum is located at 1210 Embarcadero in Morro Bay. For hours visit morrobaymaritime.org.

Morro Bay State Park

Morro Bay State Park, located at 60 State Park Rd. Morro Bay, features lagoon and bay habitat, all in view of Morro Rock. The park has opportunities for sailing, fishing, hiking and bird watching and features a marina and an 18-hole golf course. The Morro Bay Golf Course is located at 201 State Park Rd. Call (805) 772-1923 for hours and tee times.

The park is a California state park, visit parks.ca.gov for information about parking, hours and other attractions.

North Point Natural Area

Operated by the City of Morro Bay, the North Point Natural Area has a stairway that leads down to the beach. Once on the beach, people can walk north to Cayucos or south to Morro Rock. The beach has one of the best tidepool areas. In the spring, the meadow is full of blooming wildflowers. The entry is located on Toro Lane in Morro Bay.

Black Hill Trail

Located at Main St and Parkview Dr., this 2.5 mile trail is a moderate hike. The trail is a favorite spot for nature walks and birdwatching. Leashed dogs are welcome.

Giant chessboard at Centennial Parkway

According to the United States Chess Federation, the Giant Chessboard at Centennial Parkway, 806 Embarcadero, is only one of two outdoor chessboards in the United States. The other is located in New York City. The Morro Bay Chess Club installed chess tables and benches adjacent to the Giant Chessboard. The Giant

Chessboard is available for reservations, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., through the Morro Bay Recreation Services for a small fee. Visitors are always welcomed to join the Morro Bay Chess Club on Saturdays beginning at noon. For more information call (805) 772-6278




Art Center Morro Bay, 75 years of vibrant creative legacy

Art exhibits, classes, workshops, and demonstrations for everyone

The large purple building with its iconic mural of Morro Rock in downtown Morro Bay is a must-visit for art appreciators and artists. Art Center Morro Bay (MBAA) has been offering art exhibits and art-related activities since 1951. This nonprofit, volunteer-run art center is a destination for emerging and professional exhibitors and art collectors who appreciate compelling exhibits filled with a vast array of quality art.

Art all year

Art Center Morro Bay presents eight exhibits annually with two spacious galleries and a classroom. Special juried exhibits have included the Pastel Society of the West Coast, featuring award-winning, national, and international artists.

Free demonstrations by talented artists are presented on the second Monday of each month from 3 -5 p.m. This event is free and open to the public.

Adult art classes and workshops are offered throughout the year, and summer art camp is designed for children over the age of six. Drop-in figure drawing is offered every Wednesday evening from 6-9 p.m. for a minimal fee to cover the cost of the model. Fine art classes and workshops may include, plein-air painting, portrait painting, sketching, and digital drawing. Craft classes include clay sculpture and jewelry.

A history of art and community


Beginning in 1951, seventeen artists met in local homes, hanging their paintings on neighborhood trees, using whatever space was available for shows. The association acquired its current home in 1971 and has become an integral part of the community since opening its doors.

Among MBAA's most cherished legacies is Morro Bay Art in the Park, one of California's longest-running outdoor art festivals. This event is not only a treasured tradition, it's also MBAA's most important fundraiser, helping sustain scholarships, art programs, and the gallery's operations yearround. 

David's workshops and online courses make watercolor accessible to students across the globe. Through live online watercolor mastery workshops held twice





Fishing on the pier and from the shore of Cayucos State Beach is a favorite activity for locals and visitors. No fishing license is needed. Surf fishing is also allowed but a license is needed. Deep sea fishing is also available from local commercial fishing businesses.

The allure of Schooners—great food, community, stunning views, and local talent

The laid-back vibes of Cayucos blend perfectly with the relaxed atmosphere of Schooners. Just steps away from the beach, you can drop your beach blanket in the car and walk directly into the restaurant. It's all about the views and the seafood for this Cayucos institution.

It's been a favorite of both locals and visitors since 1994, when founder Bill Larkin purchased the 1930s building and transformed it into the restaurant and bar it is today. The famous upstairs bar was once an apartment, and many locals still remember the woman who lived there for many years.

Schooners has a space for everyone. Diners can sit downstairs in a covered patio and watch the waves and beachgoers, or in the dog-friendly outdoor patio, complete with a water wheel. However, his Hawaii days are evident in the welcoming and charming atmosphere at Schooners, where he brought his love of music. Locals and visitors can belt out their favorite tunes at the Wednesday, 7 p.m. open-mic nights.







- Santa Rosa Creek Preserve includes valuable riparian forests and coastal wetlands, that provide habitat for endangered Tidewater Goby.
- San Simeon Natural Preserve covers vast wetlands, riparian areas, and several undisturbed native plant communities and is a wintering site for monarch butterflies.
- The 13.7 acre Pa-nu Cultural Preserve contains an archaeological site dated to 5850 years before the present era. The site holds significant evidence of prehistoric technology and life patterns.

A 3.3 mile trail runs through parts of the San Simeon Natural Preserve, with a portion of the trail being wheelchair accessible. The trail includes scenic overlooks, rest-stop benches and interpretive panels. The park address is 500 San Simeon Creek Road, Cambria. Call (805) 927-2010 for information about days and times the park is open.

Nitt Witt Ridge

This California Registered Historical Landmark #939 is famous for the artistic use of recycled materials used in its construction. Reclusive artist Arthur Harold Beal purchased the land in 1928 and spent the next 50 years creating his own version of a castle. Building materials include beer cans, concrete, washing machines, car parts, old stoves and abalone shells.



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


Center (currently under renovation) at 2110 Main Street in Cambria.

just a short drive to Hearst Castle and the elephant seals in San Simeon.





A fitting match for Annie's commitment to supporting local, woman/family-owned, small, and fair-trade artisans, Course & Wale supports knitting non-profits that build skills, offer comfort, and provide warmth. Cheers, dears!

Great for gifts too

Cute project bags and greeting cards by Emma Ball, handy knitting lights from Lumos & Lumos, and hand-crafted wooden yarn minders by Lemonwood are among the offerings. The city of Atascadero, originally founded by E.G. Lewis in the early 1900s as a utopian community, is a popular location for shopping, dining and strolls along the lake shore. Home to the Charles Paddock Zoo, the town has a large selection of restaurants offering a range of cuisine from rib-sticking American style to Asian, Mediterranean and more. Breweries, wine tasting, bakeries, antique stores, specialty shops, boutiques and art galleries are tucked away in locations along the main El Camino Real and on side streets around the Sunken Gardens. Popular area wineries are only a short drive from downtown and any of the town's several hotels.

Attractions

Atascadero Lake Park

A 1.3-mile easy walk path circles the lake in the park providing views of the lake, the many varieties of birds that frequent the lake and other visiting wildlife. Bring binoculars: more than 48 species of birds have been sighted at the lake and recorded on ebirds.org. Leashed dogs are allowed and the path is also a favorite place for cyclists. The park has restrooms, small barbecue and recreation areas. The Faces of Freedom Veterans Memorial occupies the edge of the park facing Morro Road and is well worth a visit. The park is located at 9305 Pismo Ave, Atascadero just off of Morro Road (Highway 41).

Central Coast Zoo

The zoo is one of only 211 zoos accredited by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association, this zoo was founded in 1955 by Charles Paddock, a county park ranger who nursed injured wild animals back to health. Today, the zoo covers more than five acres. Many of the zoo residents are part of a world-wide program to preserve animals and their habitats. Some of these rare and endangered animals include the American Alligator and endangered owls and the Greater Roadrunner native to California. The zoo is located at 9100 Morro Rd. Atascadero. Historic City Hall

Atascadero's historic city hall is probably the city's best known historic building. Located at 6500 Palma Ave. and gracing the back of the Sunken Gardens, the double-domed Italian Renaissance building was originally constructed in 1914 as the Atascadero Administration Building. After founder E.G. Lewis

declared bankruptcy the building was purchased in 1927 and, over the years, served as three different private schools and a bank. It became the Veterans Memorial Building when acquired by the County of San Luis Obispo in 1954, and served as a community building. When the City of Atascadero incorporated in 1979, government offices occupied the building until it suffered major damage in the 2003 San Simeon Earthquake. After years of reconstruction and restoration, Historic City Hall opened again in 2013.



Central Coast Zoo—the local zoo with global presence

Conservation in action and fun learning experiences

From the local California condor to the southern Madagascar Radiated tortoise, the Central Coast Zoo plays a role in global species conservation and animal well-being. A visit to the zoo is more than an opportunity to see and learn about endangered animals from around the world. It is a way to support local and global conservation efforts and an opportunity to be part of activities that help protect threatened species.



The local zoo is accredited by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), and is one of only 254 zoos worldwide that meet the highest standards for animal care, conserva-

tion, and educational experiences. AZA-accredited zoos work to save animals from extinction through global programs for preserving threatened animals, monitoring endangered natural habitats, breeding, and reintroducing animals to their native habitats.

"Reintroducing an animal into their natural habitat isn't as easy as turning them loose," said Dr. Cynthia Stringfield, director of the Central Coast Zoo. "It involves making sure their habitats are reestablished and safe so that the species survives and flourishes." Carefully monitored breeding programs make sure there are healthy animals ready to be released, and habitat monitoring makes sure that habitats are sufficiently restored to support the future of the animals.

When visiting makes a difference

Visiting the Central Coast Zoo is a much grander experience than walking around admiring the over 300 animals that represent 100 threatened



species. It's an opportunity to learn ways to save threatened animals, make a difference for their habitats, and life on the planet.

The zoo has several fun and educational programs and events throughout the year, and any time is the perfect time to visit.

- Keeper chats, held every weekend, are educational, hands-on opportunities to learn about featured animals directly from the zoo staff.
- Children's camps, held in spring and summer, are excellent fun ways for exploring the natural world and learning how to be an ally for wildlife.
- Volunteering is the chance to be part of the behind-the-scenes experiences with zoo operations, working on everything from the gift shop and events to replanting habitats and helping prepare the animals' diets.
- The downloadable Central Coast Zoo Activity Learning Book, available from the website, introduces kids to biodiversity hotspots around the world, filled with rare animals and plants found nowhere else.

Fun events are held throughout the year. Upcoming events include a Valentine's Day event, details to be



announced soon, and the annual Party for the Planet that celebrates Earth Day every April. Check the website regularly or follow the zoo on social media for announcements.

Condors, butterflies, and tortoises

Dr. Stringfield has first-hand experience with preserving and reintroducing endangered species through her work with the California condors. "I was part of that program from the start," she said. "And now, the Central

Coast Zoo is working in the field with the Ventana Wildlife Society to vaccinate condors.

"We also assist the Xerxes Society with its annual Western monarch butterfly count at local overwintering sites, and this year, we are helping with the new tagging program," Stringfield said. She also reports that, in partnership with the San Luis Obispo County Master Gardeners' program, the zoo is establishing a monarch and pollinator garden at the Highway 41 off-ramp in Atascadero.


"We are also part of the global program preserving the endangered Madagascar Radiated tortoise," she said. "This tortoise is a good example of the perils of leaving an animal alone in its threatened habitat, or releasing it too soon."

The threats to the Radiated tortoise include poaching for the pet trade, food, and medicine. Its habitat is threatened by deforestation for agriculture and charcoal, and invasive species. When an animal is endangered, leaving it alone or attempting to return it before its habitat is stabilized is a path to extinction. While the AZA is continuing educational and environmental efforts in Madagascar, accredited zoos, including the Central Coast Zoo, are working to save this tortoise for the future. Visit the Radiated tortoise on your next trip to the Central Coast Zoo and learn what you can do to save it.

Santa Margarita is a taste of the old west. This settlement, easily reached from Highway 101 or Highway 58 is the gateway to Santa Margarita Lake and the Carrizo Plain National Monument. The small town quickly changes from the first impression of a sleepy western town to reveal surprising shops full of antiques, quirky garden art, plants, garden supplies, creative décor, restaurants serving up wholesome meals, and winery tasting rooms. The long history of Santa Margarita, from the ancestors of today's Chumash and Salinas people through the Spanish and Mexican land grants and early American settlers until today, is being researched and preserved by the Santa Margarita Historical Society.

Attractions & Tours

Santa Margarita Lake

Follow Highway 58 to Santa Margarita Park to find the lake located in Santa Margarita Regional Park at 4695 A Santa Margarita Lake Road. Be sure to head out with a full tank of gas. The lake and park offer boating, fishing, hiking trails and picnicking. The park is located on several thousand acres of land designated as open space. Call ahead (805) 781-5930 to verify boat launches, swimming and camping.

The Carizzo Plains National Monument

The 250,000 acre Carrizo Plain National Monument is the largest surviving native California grasslands. The plains are reminiscent of Africa's Serengeti, providing the highest concentration of irreplaceable wildlife in California. To reach Carizzo Plain, take Highway 58 south from Santa Margarita to 17495 Soda Lake Rd.

Santa Margarita Historical Society

The historical society takes local history online, with copies of research material held at the public library located on the corner of I & Murphy Streets. Ongoing projects include documenting a number of the

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empleton is the epitome of small town charm. Originally founded in 1886 as the last station on the southbound Southern Pacific Railroad, the town hosted horse drawn stagecoaches that met the trains and gave passengers a ride to San Luis Obispo to connect with the next stagecoach to their destinations. Even after the railroad extended the rails south to Santa Margarita in 1889, Templeton remained the shipping point for local crops and products bound eastward and to boats in shipping ports on the coast. Grain, wood, charcoal, fruit and cattle, driven from as far away as Kern County, arrived in Templeton for the next destination.

Many of the buildings from the late 1800s are still lining Main Street and housing unique shops, wineries and restaurants serving everything from hearty country breakfasts to dinner for every taste and the Templeton Historical Museum Society.







¬ucked into the rolling country-■ side of Paso Robles, Franklin Hot Springs is a sanctuary where the warmth of the water matches the warmth of its welcome. The dealers bring in new items and move things around to keep




their individual areas fresh. Welcoming and knowledgeable, they work together to ensure a pleasurable shopping experience.







Spirit of Paso Robles brings oldfashioned hospitality back to the table

A favorite of so many regulars for a reason

The Spirit of Paso Robles at River Oaks Golf Course has only been open since 2024, but it's already a favorite for locals. Good food, good views of the golf course, and good prices. What's not to like? Co-owner Mike Stanton attributes the restaurant's popularity to his and wife Ellen's philosophy of "simple food, done well."

For nearly four decades, the Stantons have been fixtures in the Central Coast restaurant scene. Mike Stanton started in 1986 at F. McLintock's in downtown San Luis Obispo. Ellen opened a popular deli in 1989, just before meeting Mike. They ran it together for 28 years and also opened another restaurant. On top of that, in 2009, Mike started managing the San Luis Obispo Country Club. They thought they might slow down or retire, but the allure of owning the Spirit of San Luis at the airport forced them to press pause on that dream and start a new one. They bought the Spirit of San Luis in 2017, and thanks to a fresh menu and interior, it's been a favorite for locals ever since.

Last year, they opened Spirit of Paso Robles at the golf course. Managed by Mike, locals love it because of the fresh food and the old-fashioned sense of hospitality. Mike explains, "We're proud of the fact that we take good care of people. We have so many regulars for a reason. We see them coming in, and they like the same table every time. So, we get them that table. Whatever it is, we take care of it for people."

'Simple food done well'

So, what's the most popular thing on the menu? Mike replied, "Probably the Cowboy Cuban Sandwich. It's our take on the




Cubano—Cuban sandwich. A true Cubano has ham, roasted pork, and Swiss cheese. Ours is smoked brisket, smoked pulled pork, Swiss cheese, and mustard. We call it the Paso Cowboy version of a Cubano. Also, our smash burger is spot-on."

The same hospitality extends to large groups. "We're comfortable with putting tables together and serving groups of 8,10, 12 people. We never charge for a large group." The restaurant regularly hosts book clubs, bridge clubs, and car clubs—and provides separate checks when asked. Stanton insists that they don't mind because it's part of that old-fashioned sense of hospitality.

The Stantons emphasize keeping the prices reasonable, but also keeping the quality high. He says, "We refer to it as simple food done well. It's not fancy food. It's not gourmet, but it's honest food, and it's excellent."

"What sets our restaurants apart is that they're local places," Mike explains. "Even our location at the San Luis airport is for locals. We've created spaces where people can come, enjoy excellent food, and feel at home." Ellen manages Spirit of San Luis.







Both restaurants feature free convenient parking, a relaxed atmosphere, and menus that highlight scratch-made dishes crafted from top-tier ingredients. Certified Angus beef, in-house smoked meats (an 18-hour process), fresh dressings, and homemade barbecue sauces are just a few examples of the care that goes into every meal.

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Savor the flavor: Taste local premium olive oils

Olive oil tasting involves smelling the aroma of an oil, and then sipping it to taste its positive attributes. Official tasters drink the oil from dark blue glasses, to ensure they can't see the color of the olive oil (and be influenced by an oil's green or gold color).

Look for three qualities

Tasters should look for these three positive attributes:

Fruitiness: Any positive organic smell or taste.

Bitterness: A sign of freshness that is usually tasted on the sides of the tongue.

Pungency: A peppery, burning sensation in the throat.

Not all olive oils have all three of the attributes, but some should be present. Try it for yourself!! Grab that bottle you've had in the pantry for ages, and taste it to see if it's still good. Pour some into a wine glass—about an inch or two high—cover the glass with one hand while warming the base of the glass with the other. Place your nose into the glass after a minute and breathe in. Does it smell fruity, like green apples, cut grass, or tomato leaf? Great! Or does it smell unpleasant, like paint thinner, bacon, or a musty cellar? In that case, it's probably defective and should be thrown out.

Next, slurp in about a quarter of a teaspoon and let it sit on your tongue while you breathe in. Finally, swallow a bit and look for any signs of pepper in the throat. If an oil has a greasy feeling on your tongue, it's probably past its prime.



Remember, olive oil is a fresh product, much like a fruit juice. It needs to be used within 24 months of when it's made, and it needs to be used within a few months of opening the bottle.

In recognition of their decades of dedication, Castoro was honored in 2020 by the Paso Robles Wine Country Alliance as the Environmental Winery of the Year.



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Bimmer and Niels Udsen's dedication to the environment and sustainable, responsible farming

is a practice passed down by Niels' Danish father, Although Niels was born in Ventura, CA, he often visited Denmark and met Bimmer there. They share the same passion, vision, and commitment to the soil, wine, people, and community.


Castoro

Cellars was established in 1983, when fewer than twenty wineries operated in the Paso Robles area; today, that number has grown to over 250. The Udsens began their journey sourcing fruit and making wine, eventually building a winery and tasting room, and purchasing

property. By 1990, they were fully involved in the entire operation and haven't looked back since, but

> they do look forward.

Today, over four acres of solar panels offset the power needed to operate the winery and tasting room. Castoro is the largest grower of organic grapes on the Central Coast. The roughly 1400 acres



of 100% certified organic vineyards grow 27 different varietals of French, Italian, and Spanish grapes in 14 vineyards.

Sit, sip, and savor

Head winemaker Tom Myers has been producing wines in Paso



Robles since 1978, establishing himself as a true pioneer in the wine industry. He joined Castoro in 1990 and has been leading the winemaking team ever since. Besides his various degrees, Tom's hands-on experience is unmatched, and he creates wines that genuinely showcase the terroir, letting the earth and grapes speak for themselves.

Tastings will vary depending on the time of year and availability, but you will always enjoy a selection of single-varietal and blended wines. Sample single varietals like primitivo, zinfandel, cabernet sauvignon, pinot grigio, albariño, and a range of creative, palate-pleasing blends.

Most of the year, the weather is ideal for sitting outside, surrounded by the pastoral view of Castoro's vineyards and the landscape beyond. In real estate, there's a saying: "location, location, location." Now, add elegant wine and top-notch hospitality to the location, and you've just experienced a moment in Shangri-la.


Moved by the spirits

Spending time in Italy, Niels became fascinated with Italian-style grappa, which naturally led to expanding the family legacy. After obtaining the first distilling licenses in the county, Niels began crafting spirits, and Bethel Rd Distillery became a reality in 2013.

Located just across the road from Castoro Cellars and managed by sons Luke and Max Udsen, the distillery marks another chapter in the Udsen family's legacy of SIP and CCOF certifications. The brothers grow their own organic yeast, compost, produce their own fertilizer, use electric tractors, 100% hand-harvest, and sort the grapes.

Bethel Rd Distillery, a journey of family legacy

Following where the spirits lead

Blake Franco, the tasting room manager at Bethel Rd Distillery, wasn't wrong when he welcomed our tasting party to "the most unknown, underrated view in Paso Robles wine country." The view of rolling hills and vineyards, with birds of prey soaring overhead, along with the spacious, inviting outdoor seating areas, was perfect on a Central Coast fall day to enjoy tasting Bethel Rd's spirits—and wine!

Bethel Rd Distillery, opened in 2016, is another dimension of the vision of environmental sustainability from the pioneering Udsen family, founders of Castoro Cellars. During his time in Italy, Niels Udsen envisioned making grappa, a distilled spirit created from leftover grape seeds, skins, and stems. This idea naturally aligned with the Udsen family's commitment to sustainability, regenera-

tion, and respect for the land. "Why not transform winemaking leftovers into grappa and produce high-quality brandy, gin, and liqueur?" he asked.

So, he did.
Bethel Rd Distillery holds one of the earliest-issued distillery licenses in the county and is one of 13 distilleries on the Paso Robles Distillery Trail, the only designated spirits trail in California.

The Udsen sons are spearheading the distillery, following the family legacy for sustainability.



Max is the head distiller, and Luke heads up marketing and entertainment for both venues.

Let the spirits move you

Although the Spirit Tasting Flight selection may vary at times, our party was treated to the current tasting list, which included:

Neutral Brandy, a modern, clean neutral brandy from organic estate-grown grapes, and the foundation for the rest of the Bethel Rd brandies.

• Grappa
di Moscato,
the spirit that
started the Bethel

 House Brandy, caskaged, hand-crafted from estate grown vineyards, and distilled in small batches.

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
cally grown oranges, hand harvested, and infused into Neutral Brandy, or Nocino, a walnut liqueur, with clove and cinnamon.

Enjoy some wine-time, too

Bethel Rd also produces smallbatch artisanal wines under the direction of consulting winemaker Natasha Boffman. Vines are organically farmed and estate-grown in the Udsen family tradition. The grapes are 100% hand-harvested and sorted.

Plan to enjoy a wine flight. Given the variety of varietals grown, the tasting menu will change, constantly offering intriguing selections to explore.





Family and legacy

Max and Luke Udsen continue the family legacy and commitment to sustainability and the environment. The SIP and CCOF certifications awarded to the distillery are the result of careful and intentional stewardship. Sustainability and environmental programs include solar, water treatment, and other systems to offset consumption, growing organic yeast for wine production, composting and producing fertilizer, and using electric tractors.

"We are only temporary residents of the earth, so we must be sustainably responsible for those who come after us," said our host, Blake.

The distillery is situated on a historic property with buildings dating back to the early 1900s. Of particular interest is the old barn, which now functions as the distillery. A tour might reveal some fun details about the barn's structure, orientation, and the vertical beams


supporting it. Over the years, due to the barn's positioning and the daily wind from the Templeton Gap, the beams have become slightly slanted — but don't worry, they have been reinforced.

And if you visit the barrel room, you'll see the old stable with the original horse stalls still in place. The original farmhouse, next to the stable, is still maintained but is not currently in use.

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
Peachy Canyon Winery focuses on family and award-winning wines

Taste handcrafted, small-batch varietals in a historic old schoolhouse

As one of the first established wineries in Paso Robles, Peachy Canyon Winery remains a favorite of locals and visitors. Family-owned and operated, the winery is known for producing award-winning zinfandel and handcrafted small batch Rhône and Bordeaux varietals.

Established in 1988 by Doug and Nancy Beckett, Peachy Canyon Winery has been under the fulltime care of their sons, Josh and Jake Beckett, for the past several years.

"We consistently hear from our guests how much they appreciate

visiting our familv-owned business," Jake said. "I rely heavily on our team members. and I couldn't do it without all of them. From the vineyards to production to the tasting room, we have a great team."

Doug points to the family involvement as making Peachy Canyon Winery the success it is today. He shared that through good times and bad, together they have always been able to ride it out. The Becketts are especially appreciative of the local community support over the years.

"Nancy and I are more of a resource now at the winery than

active participants," Doug shared. "We try to get to the tasting room as often as possible, and we enjoy meeting our customers and club members."

Peachy Canyon winemaker Drew Phillips

Head winemaker Drew Phillips earned his degree from Fresno State University and

has been with Peachy Canyon Winery for nearly a decade. Alongside his winemaking team, Phillips enjoys



trying new approaches, including using different barrels, doing native yeast ferments, and inoculating the estate grapes to formulate more interesting flavors and wines.

"Drew's style of winemaking is the perfect marriage with our tasting room style," Jake said. "He's unassuming, full of knowledge, and has a gentle hand when it comes to making wine. Our wines are balanced and approachable, just like Drew's personality. He's easygoing, yet super technical, and loves to experiment." Peachy Canyon wines change depending on the harvest. The last several vintages produced an even more balanced, food-friendly, and approachable selection, according to Jake. Reflecting the longstanding commitment to quality, their wines have garnered awards and honors such as Winery of the Year; double golds from the Central Coast Wine Competition, Vinous, and Wine Enthusiast; listing in Wine Spectator's Top 100 Wines in the World, and more.

Discover crowd-pleasing wines at Peachy Canyon

One of the most requested wines is Peachy Canyon Especial Zinfandel, a wine the family has been making since 1989. With scents of berry brambles and baking spices on the nose, and supple flavors of berry cobbler and toffee, it's a crowd pleaser. Be sure to try the Concrete Blanc, a crisp white Rhône blend of grenache blanc, viognier, roussanne, and picpoul blanc.



The GSM, a year-round favorite, is highly recommended by Phillips and his winemaking team. This juicy and balanced Rhône-style blend of grenache, syrah, and mourvedre features aromas of ripe Bing cherries and rose petals with flavors of strawberries, cassis, and white pepper. Peachy Canyon's Petite Sirah is ideal for those with a preference for a bigger wine.

"Our entire lineup of wines is awesome, and that's due to Drew's skills," Jake said. "They're rich and yummy, with controlled, balanced alcohol without overwhelming the wine style. Even with some of our bigger wines, such as our cabernets and petite sirahs, Drew and his team have a way of keeping them smooth and velvety."

Old World-style tasting room

Step up to the long, meandering bar inside the Peachy Canyon Old Schoolhouse tasting room and sample a wide variety of estategrown varietals. White walls and wood accents lend a classic, old-world feel to the interior. The vibe is classic and comfortable in this



historic landmark. Outside, enjoy lush landscaping, vineyard views, a picnic area, a gazebo, and oak trees.

Tasting room manager Bryce Seguin works alongside Tajin "T" Flores, the wine club manager, and their friendly, knowledgeable, and welcoming tasting room team. Along with the award-winning estate zinfandels, visitors find handcrafted small-batch Rhône and Bordeaux varietals that are only

available for purchase in the tasting room.

The gift shop includes t-shirts, sweatshirts, local honey and olives, gourmet chocolates, and more. Charcuterie boxes and cheese plates



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are available. Larger groups are encouraged to call ahead to request larger plates. The tasting room offers juice tastings for children, and there's a designated outdoor area for visitors with on-leash dogs.

A labor of love

Peachy Canyon's production has been reduced over the past six or so years, focusing on their three estate vineyards – Mustang Springs, Snow, and Old Schoolhouse. Each Westside Paso Robles vineyard ranges widely in terroir and is farmed using sustainable practices.

Under the direction of Rodolfo Martinez and Javier Herrera, the vineyard team keeps the fields and 80 acres of estate vineyards healthy and happy. Water conservation is important, and the fruit is harvested by hand.

"We have a choreography we all dance to at harvest time, and it's pretty cool," Jake said. "Communication is essential, so we make sure we're picking the fruit Drew is expecting us to pick. Sustainable farming takes a lot of time and a lot more tractor driving, but it's what we focus on."

Reflecting on nearly 40 years in the industry, Doug said he and

Nancy didn't establish Peachy
Canyon Winery as an investment,
but as a second career after they
both retired from teaching. "Even
more importantly," he said, "it's
been a way to demonstrate how
family can work together and make
a difference. Family has always been
a priority for us. It's been our hope
from the start that future generations would carry Peachy Canyon
forward."

Jake agreed, saying, "We love farming, we love the industry, and we feel grateful and blessed to be part of it. Day after day, we work as a team here and have a good time while we're doing it. We hope that comes across to everyone who visits – we want everyone to feel welcome and enjoy our wines!"

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The story of Seven Angels Cellars—the full circle of family, friendship, and dreams

Boutique winery is known for Rhône blends and signature single varietal offerings

Seven Angels Cellars is a family business owned and operated by Pamela and Greg Martin, a couple with a passion for family, food, and wine. They married in 2008 and launched the winery the following year. The winery, named in honor of their seven children, their "seven angels", is a passion project for Pamela and Greg. Both have retired so they can focus on the things they enjoy, with wine taking center stage.



Greg grew up in a rural area of California with neighbors who grew wine grapes. He spent a lot

of time learning about the entire vine-to-bottle process from his patient neighbor. His interest in wine expanded when, stationed with the U.S. Coast Guard in the Bay Area, he had easy access to the wineries in Sonoma and Napa. Pamela comes from a family of foodies and wine enthusiasts. She took winemaking courses in college and learned the biology aspect of wine. She worked in catering and on TV as a home economist for a cooking show. Pairing food and wine to create an interesting and delightful balance in a meal has become an obsession for her.

Greg has been friends with Mike Emling, owner of Dark Star Cellars, for over 40 years. They used to sit in the backyard, sipping wine and talking about making wine someday. A few years ago, Mike approached the Martins about an available tasting room space on the Paso Robles 46 West Wineries Trail. The tasting room was adjacent to Dark Star Cellars, and the couple jumped at the opportunity to work with their friend.

"We love our original location on the Paso Back Roads Winery Trail. We enjoyed helping build that brand and working with so many wonderful people. Although we miss being part of that group, we were excited to join the 46 West Wineries," said Pamela

"When we first started making wine, it was at Dark Star Cellars when the original owner was there. So many things seem to have come full circle, and we were delighted to be operating from this new location. We are excited about the outdoor space with live music most weekends and the opportunity to launch new events. Working side by side with my friend is a definite perk", commented Greg.

The Martins plan to keep their production small, with approximately 1,000 cases per year. In addition to chardonnay, mourvèdre, and syrah from their estate vineyard, they source fruit from premium vineyards on the Central Coast. The boutique winery is best known for its Rhône blends and signature single varietal offerings such as syrah and merlot. They also offer chardonnay, grenache blanc, viognier, and a white blend named Unorthodox.

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Le Vigne Winery, from cattle ranching to 2025 Winery of the Year

High honors from the Central Coast Wine Competition and the New York International Wine Competition

Le Vigne Winery grew from a tradition that created an award-winning, sustainably farmed winery from a place of soil and spirit. It began as a family passion for farming and ranching, raising chickens and cattle in Ramona, California, in 1968. Eventually, that passion turned to the 400-acre Rancho Roble, which the family owned in Paso Robles, and then to grapes.

Today's Le Vigne (Italian for "the vineyard") rose from Sylvia and Walter Filippini's commitment to their individual family heritages. Born a half a world apart, Sylvia in California, and Walter in Italy, the couple met over a business deal in Gardena, California. Walter was a partner in the Ital Cheese Factory, and Sylvia was seeking to be the sole distributor of their products.

Before Sylvia and Walter met and wed, her father, Sylvester Feichtinger, had already planted vineyards on Rancho Roble. His first plantings were in 1982, a year before the Paso Robles AVA was established. By 1990, he had launched Sylvester Vineyards and Winery. Thirty-five years later, one of the region's oldest family estate wineries was honored as 2025 Winery of the Year by the Central Coast Wine Competition and the 2025 Paso Robles Winery of the Year by the New York International Wine Competition.

Pairing wine with romance


Walter was raised in Como, Italy, and grew up among the vineyards of Valtellina. That region is known for the nebbiolo grape, which is



similar to the sangiovese, barbera, and aglianico grapes grown in California vineyards. Walter followed his passion for cooking at the Culinary Institute in San Pellegrino. In 1981, he earned first place in Italy's National Chef's Competition. In the mid-1980s, he was lured to California, where he soon met Sylvia.

Along with pursuing her own business and personal interests, including a passion for rescuing animals, Sylvia had a role in her father, Sylvester's, winery, and Walter joined her in the business. By 1996, the Filippinis were managing the winery and restaurant. In 2013, they renamed it to Le Vigne.

Sylvia's passion for rescuing animals started as a child, "Much to my mother's dismay," said Sylvia. The Fillippini's personal residence near the winery is home to retired racehorses, donkeys, and some goats and sheep. "I even rescued some swan cygnets, once," she relates. Someone called her at her home in Southern California, announcing that turtles were eating cygnets at a local lake. "So I raised four cygnets in my kitchen. We have pictures of my 6-month-old girl with the swans in her stroller."




Buddy, the min-pin mix who was rescued from Los Angeles railroad tracks 14 years ago, can be seen trotting along behind Walter. All the aging Buddy wants is to be close to Walter. "Please don't try to pet Buddy," warns Sylvia. He's losing his hearing and vision and may snap if startled.

The vineyards, the wine, and sustainability

A vision evolved from Sylvia's commitment to her family vineyards and Walter's superb chef skills, and roots in his family vineyards. Supported by a talented Le Vigne team, accolades from the wine industry kept pouring in.

Recently, Le Vigne Cabernet Sauvignon 2021 earned five gold medals from five competitions, including the San Diego International Wine and Spirits Challenge and the New York International Wine Competition. Other multiple medal winners include:

• Le Vigne Nikiara 2021, a Bordeaux-style blend, was awarded double gold at Toast of the Coast,



and gold medals from the San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition and the Sunset International Wine Competition.

• Le Vigne Paso Robles Sauvignon Blanc won a gold medal each at the San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo Competition and Toast of the Coast.

These are only three of the award-winning wines from Le Vigne. The vineyards, the soil, climate, vineyard management, and winemaking practices all determine the quality and character of the grapes that are eventually poured into our wine glasses.

Winemaker Ben Mayo said, "I am very much involved with every aspect of the vineyards. From pruning decisions, watering schedules, fertilizer, and cover crops, as well as picking decisions."

Mayo said vine growth and maturity are monitored consistently for the best outcomes, ensuring that the winemaking team receives the best fruit. Every harvested lot is monitored to make sure the fermentation is smooth and complete.

Le Vigne currently has 125 acres planted at two estate vineyards in

the Estrella District AVA. Both vineyards benefit from alluvial soil deposited by the Estrella River and the climate of the Templeton Gap. The Domenico vineyard is two sections around the winery. The Acquarello Vineyard is located on the south bank of the Estrella River.

Le Vigne is a member of the Certified California Sustainable Winegrowers. The vineyards are sustainably farmed, supported by practices that include certified organic compost supplied on-site from restaurant, livestock, and winery waste, 17 species of cover crops, and incorporating animals into their farming practices.

An adventure in winetasting, lunch, and shopping

Tasting flights include the Classic Wine Tasting or the Signature Wine + Cheese Tasting. Reservations are highly recommended for group tastings.

Lunch features Chef Walter's oven-fired pizzas, pastas, and salads. Lunch is served most weekends from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., unless there's a special event.

The Italian Market + Cheese Shop offers imported pastas, sauces, olive oils, salamis, and more alongside local nuts, fruits, treasures, and thoughtfully prepared frozen meals. Artisan cheeses are expertly sourced from around the world.

If Paso Robles isn't on your itinerary, check out the Los Angeles Tasting Room & Italian Market. There is wine tasting, entertainment, charcuterie-making classes, and special guest speakers. Reserve your spot for lunch featuring Chef Walter's paninis and shop the market for a second dessert.


